OTTAWA (CP) — Donald Lachance is only four, but how he can handle those big policemen at No. 1 police station! When he chooses not to answer questions, nobody can make him talk.

The blonde, blue-eyed boy was back in his nearby Eastview home Friday, but Thursday he gave police who found him wandering alone in the capital a tough time.

At first, all he'd say was: "I'm Donnie." Then he let out that his mother's name is Mary, and his father's Ernest.

"What does your daddy do?" he was asked.

"He washes floors." "Where does he wash floors?" "At home." "What's your last name, Donnie?" "Just Donnie. That's all."

The boy got fed up with the questions: "I'm not goin' to talk." Later, "You're a hoot four, Donnie, aren't you?" "Are you four?" Donnie asked the cop "I'm only two."

Four hours of this and the policemen were sweating and ready to give up.

Then there was a break in the case. His parents called police to say their boy was lost.

## Woman Slashed To Death Former Friend Is Charged

TORONTO (CP) — Gregorio Gianotti, 36, described by police as a "one-time lover who was trying to call the affair off," Wednesday was charged with murder in the stabbing Tuesday night of a married woman with whom he had been keeping company.

Gianotti, Italian-born supervisor in a toy factory, was remanded to Aug. 3.

Police said shapely Mrs. Lilo Storm, 27, was slashed to death with a kitchen paring knife on the verandah of the house she lived in in west-central Toronto.

Investigators said the attractive brunette came to Canada from Frankfurt, Germany, nine months ago and became friendly with Gianotti while waiting for her husband, Otto, to come from Germany. Three months after she arrived, her husband joined her but the couple separated after a week, police said.

Officers said Mrs. Sturm suffered "five or six" stab wounds. One slash encircled her throat, almost decapitating her.

Roger Sucimski, a roomer in the house, said Mrs. Sturm and a man were in the house earlier in the evening and left together.

Police said Mrs. Sturm returned to the house with a man after visiting various drinking spots. Leo Sucimski, a neighbor, said he heard an argument start and

went to investigate when he heard a woman scream for help.

"I realized something was wrong and ran across the street, onto the lawn of the house. On the verandah I saw the man making stabbing motions—I saw no knife at the time—and then the woman collapsed, beating her hands around her."

Sucimski said he followed a man, stopped him and held him until police arrived. He said the man had a knife in his hand.

### Eleven New Fires

Continued high temperatures and lack of rain caused 11 new forest fires Thursday, bringing the Ontario total to 117.

Earlier in the day light rains in various parts of the northern forest area had slowed the fires' progress to the point where men and equipment could be taken right to the edge of the fire for closeup work.

Ontario lands and forests officials said Thursday the 11 new fires and 19 others still are burning out of control. From noon Wednesday until late Thursday, 21 fires had been extinguished.

More than 5,000 men were fighting the northland fires.

## Safety Responsibility Law Just A Scrap Of Paper Unless It Is Enforced

HALIFAX (CP)—The All-Canadian Insurance Federation Tuesday told Nova Scotia's royal commission on automobile insurance that a safety responsibility law is "just another piece of paper with printing . . . if it is not enforced."

The Council for the Federation, representing companies selling automobile insurance, said that one defect of this type of legislation was that a driver without financial responsibility could have the "first accident," thereby causing injury or loss to another party.

The unsatisfied judgment fund was the last resort for damage payments but this had been operating at a loss.

The federation's brief suggested that only claims for bodily injury and death—and not property damage—be paid from the fund.

John P. McNeil, mayor of New Waterford, told the commission the town's council recommended the Nova Scotia government go into the automobile insurance business on a system similar to the one in Saskatchewan. Mayor McNeil also said that payments under the unsatisfied judgment fund involved "too much red tape."
