New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The strongest recovery move of the current four-week reaction developed last week in the stock market.

The recovery was nothing like the two previous rallies this year but of course, the present reaction is nothing like its two predecessors.

The market has been backing and filling with brief advances and retreats that have carried the price level down gradually. The pace of trading has been slow, whereas exceptionally high volume accompanied the previous market moves.

On the final three days of last week the market advanced, the best sustained strength it has been able to muster. The rise wasn't a runaway affair, but it did break the pattern of the decline.

And now the question naturally is whether the market can keep up that gain with enough determination to challenge the old high marks of late April.

NEEDS MORE VOLUME

Many brokers believe that the market can't do that unless it develops a lot of volume. Without new vigor in business, they contend, the market is likely to drift down some more before it starts a challenging rally.

Last week the Associated Press average of 60 stocks was ahead \$1.00 at \$163.50. The April 26 peak was \$166.80. On the other hand, the low of the year was \$148.80 on Jan. 17.

The New York stock exchange were General Dynamics up 3% at 61 1/2 on 160,100 shares, Electric and Musical Industries up 3/4 at 45, Boeing up 2 1/2 at 61, Textron up 1 1/2 at 32 1/2, and Sunray Mid-Continent Petroleum preferred "A" up 1/2 at 25 1/2.

Among Canadian stocks on the New York exchange, Dome Mines gained 1/2 at 16 1/2, McIntyre rose 1/2 to 21, Canadian Pacific climbed 1 1/2 to 72 1/2, Hiram Walker added 3/4 to 72 1/2, Distillers Seagram rose 2 1/2 to 39 1/2 and International Nickel dropped 1/2 to 63 1/2.

On the American stock exchange Giant Yellowknife lost 1/2 to 5 1/2 and Royalite Oil added 1/2 at 12.

U.S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel consumers, hoping to beat a price rise scheduled for May and June shipment. Steel magazine says.

The metalworking weekly explains that steel is billed at prices in effect at time of shipment. Steel says:

"With mill order books loaded on some products, there's danger that part of the tonnage scheduled for second-quarter delivery will not get delivered until the third quarter. Early in that period a steel price rise is expected to come as a result of steelworkers' wage negotiations."

Also pressing for mill shipments are canners, needing tin plate. Steel reports the push for deliveries and continued ordering is keeping mills operating at near capacity rates.

The U. S. output of steel for ingots and castings last week was at the record level of 2,328,800 net tons for the third consecutive week. Mills worked at 96.5 per cent of rated capacity.

Both mill production and new ordering exceed current consumption. Steel says, because consumers are putting steel into inventory.

Canadian Press Staff Writer ST. JOHN'S (CP)—Unless Newfoundland's coastal shipping business is revived, some people are predicting serious transportation problems for the outport communities.

One of the worried men is the general secretary of the Newfoundland Federation of Fishermen who says the coastal shipping business will be dead within 10 years unless prospective owners are "subsidized to an appreciable extent." And if the fleet dies, C. M. Lane says, the overall effects will be "drastic."

First of all, he points out, fishermen living in settlements not served by CNR coasters won't be able to transport fish to market and even more important, stable food supplies couldn't be carried to outport communities.

About 15 years ago, says Mr. Lane, boat owners who received subsidies could build a ship for prices varying from \$120 to \$200 per ton. Today, he says, prices run between \$600 and \$800. The ships now dying out of service are not being replaced, he says, because prices can't be met.

With all its implications, the problem of the decreasing coastal shipping business is almost a sure bet to be tossed around the floor of the federation's annual convention which opens here May 10. And any resolutions will likely be based on reports of outport delegates representing the federation's 250 locals. They live in communities where coastal fleets are economically essential.

It is not known how many ships are actively engaged in coastal food supplies but Mr. Lane says the fleet is down to a mere skeleton and is still declining.

Four Plan Daring Trip Across Atlantic On Raft

MONTREAL (CP)—Four daring young men have begun construction of a raft which they hope will carry them across the Atlantic.

Henri Beaudout, 28, captain of the raft, said the group has already obtained the lumber—B.C. cedar—"and we have enough equipment to complete the raft itself."

"We have no equipment other than that needed to build our raft," he said in an interview.

"But although we need about \$5,000 worth of sleeping, fishing and survival equipment—including food—we have definitely made up our minds that we shall leave Montreal's Victoria pier May 28."

HOPE FOR AID

Beaudout said his crew—Bernard Sauriol, 24, navigator; Gaston Vanacker, 28, cameraman; and Paul Lapointe, 25, radio operator—hopes that Montrealers will help them "breach the gap."

The group plans to be towed to Quebec City so as not to interfere with regular river traffic.

"At Quebec City we will receive an official provincial flag from a member of the Quebec legislature and from there we are on our own."

The trip, one of the first of its kind across the Atlantic, is expected to rival the famous trip of the Kon-Tiki which crossed the Pacific a number of years ago.

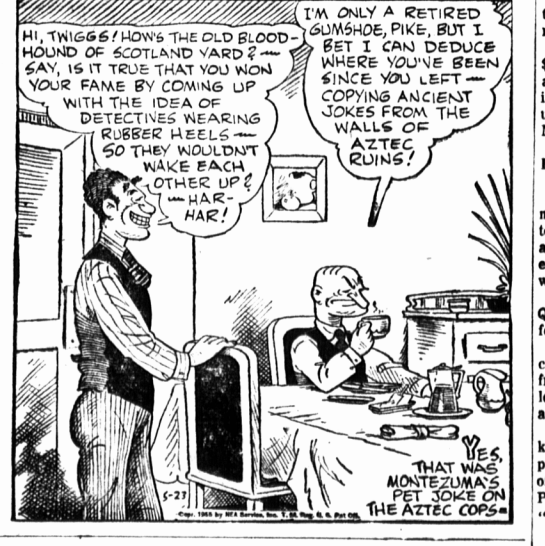

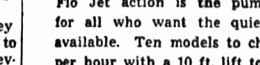

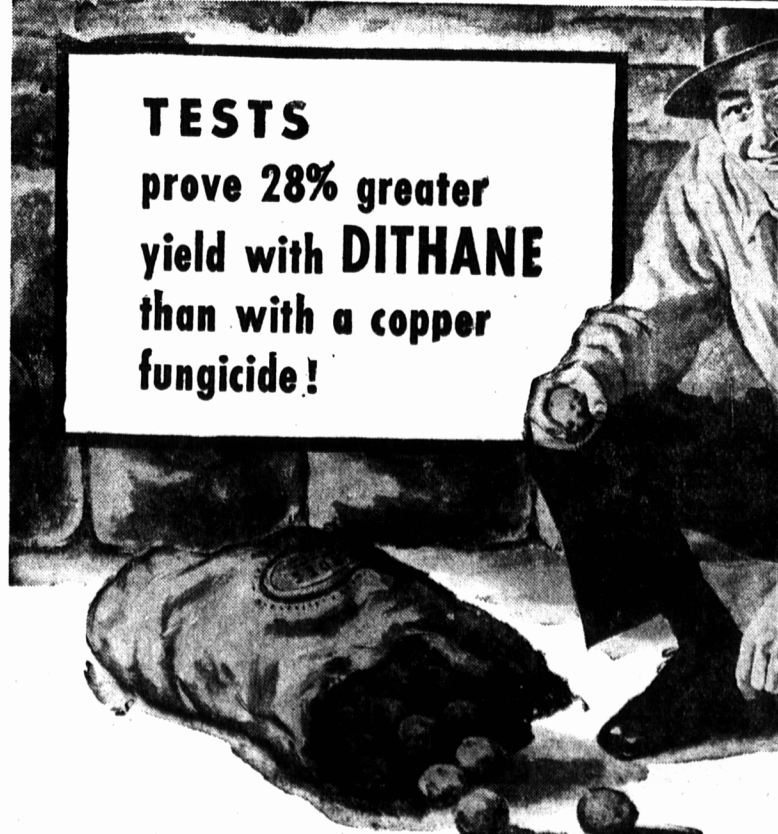
