He inferred, then he did not want to continue in the post. Davis succeeded Joe Foss a commissioner when it appeared the two circuits were on the threshold of an out-and-out raiding war involving players, Woodward, Foss' assistant, resigned when Foss was dropped. Woodward's exact title, salary and length of contract could not be learned. It was reported that Davis had been paid in full for the three-year contract he signed last April.
