"You're the first clergyman I've ever heard say that," said panel member Mrs. H. L. Patterson of Charlottetown.

"I'm not a member of the church, and the clergy in his criticism. His comments were never always met calmly by delegates.

"Christ never told Christian women their main was to raise the almighty dollar and wear a badge," he said. "He said us what to do—minister to the sick and the unfortunate, and spread the gospel. Yet today many of us require people to be in our image before we will help."
