The Pier Question.

Why does not the Patriot publish the Minute of Council of the Island Government, and the memoranda of the delegates on the pier question? The first of these documents, which lays the foundation for all the correspondence which has taken place, was distributed in printed form, in the House of Assembly on Monday evening. But the Patriot carefully suppressed it and the memoranda which followed it! Instead of allowing its readers to read these documents for themselves and judge of their contents, it deliberately proceeds to falsify and distort them.

The Patriot says that the only definite promise contained in the reply of the Dominion Government, is the declaration of readiness to give a proprietary title to the Local Government to any foreshore which the Dominion does not wish to retain. "This offer" says the Patriot "which by the correspondence appears to have been first made verbally to the delegates they apparently declined without thanks."

This offer does not appear by the correspondence to have been first made verbally to the delegates, and was not declined by them either with or without thanks.

The correspondence shows most plainly, that the verbal offer made to the Delegates was, "to vest in the Government of Prince Edward Island a title to such of these Piers as might be reported as not of importance to the Dominion." This offer the delegates emphatically declined; and it does not appear in the reply of the Dominion. These facts imply a full recognition of the claim of the Island.

When the Patriot announced the success of the delegation, it at once began to sound the alarm about the alleged surrender of our foreshores. On the 7th of March its editor said,--

"There is, however, another aspect of the question to be considered. If the Dominion Government is the sole owner of the soil in our harbors and extensions, every private individual who desires to build a warehouse for shipping purposes, a fishing station, or a private wharf, must apply to the Dominion Government for a grant. For this service the authorities at Ottawa may charge a high figure, and thus seek to recoup themselves for their outlay on the Wharves and Piers. People who have built private wharves, fishing stations, or any other structure, extending beyond low water mark, since Confederation, had better look to their titles."

Now, when it appears that the delegates have secured from the Dominion a definite offer to confirm local grants of the foreshores and give further grants to persons willing to improve these shores, the Patriot turns round, belittles the arrangement, and untruthfully asserts that the delegates declined the offer.

If this offer had not been obtained from the Dominion, the Patriot would now be ringing the changes on the danger to private interests just as he did on the 7th of March. But when the editor finds that the right of private parties having local grants to the foreshores are to be respected, and new privileges given where such may be necessary, he turns round and falsifies the correspondence which he unfaithfully withholds from his readers.

The ex-Governor insists that the case of the Island has not been presented in a "respectful and dignified manner." Why not publish the correspondence and allow his readers to judge for themselves? With regard to "dignity" our contemporary's standard is no doubt very high. An illustration of this may be found in his comments on the terms "Pier" and "Wharf." All the structures for the purposes of affording landing places for shipping in the Dominion are described as "Piers" in the public documents of the Dominion. The delegates, therefore, very properly used this term in the correspondence. Was it because our first Cabinet Minister under Confederation did not know that "Pier" and "Wharf" were synonymous terms, that the "Piers" or "Wharves" of this Island were not at Confederation treated the same as that of the other Provinces?

Because the Dominion Government have ordered an investigation into the claim of this Province, the ex-Governor declares that they have mistrusted the statements of delegates. Had the Dominion Government paid the claim of the Province without any report from Federal officers, the Government members of Parliament would denounce them for doing so. The Patriot knows this very well. In fact it has already announced that this course would be pursued, predicting "a lively time" when the correspondence would be laid before Parliament!

A careful perusal of the reply of the Dominion Government and the memoranda of the delegates will show that they contain a full admission of our claim by the General Government.

If the Dominion Government do not feel that they own the piers of the Province, why would they propose to vest in the Government of Prince Edward Island a title to any of them?

The general public importance of our pier can be very easily established. Who will venture the assertion that we have a wharf on the Island of less general importance than the one on Pictou Island which the Dominion maintains?

At the same time, the Dominion Government could not be reasonably expected to ask Parliament to vote money without a report from their own officers.

The City Hospital.

The principle that church, and other property, should not be exempt from taxation, is, no doubt, sound. Nevertheless, such property is, by law, exempt alike in town and country; and, so long as it is exempt, surely the Charlottetown Hospital should not be liable to be taxed.

It is rather unfortunate that the City Hospital is the first property to which it is sought to apply the right principle; for it looks as though the Hon. Mr. Prowse and those who supported his motion were trying to make it an exception to the rule; and, while they interpose the Legislative arm to save from taxation the means by which people (many of them rich) meet together to worship and hear sermons, they are quite willing that the means of curing the poor who are sick and in pain—the means of doing God's highest work—should be taxed.

If there should be no exemptions let it be so enacted. Let Mr. Prowse, and those who think as he does, bring in a bill in accord with their principle. But while the Legislature prevents the City Council from taxing all the churches of the town, surely it should not make an exception of the Hospital.

Short Sighted and Hard to Please.

Last year the Dominion Government made a special grant of \$65,000 to supplement the rolling stock of the P. E. Island Railway. Of course a similar grant was not made this year, and the Patriot's long howl about "the decrease in the estimated expenditure for the railway," is altogether without cause. The Patriot should know that the amount estimated this year for the ordinary running expenses of the railway is \$20,000 in excess of that of any previous year.

It is to be noted that the Patriot blames the Government (1) because the grants are not larger, and (2) because the expenditures of the Government are increasing at "such an alarming rate." So long as it is on the Opposition side, the Patriot will never be pleased.

Orwell Notes.

Messrs. D. A. McQueen, and Angus W. McLeod, left here for Winnipeg this week.

Weddings are in order now. It was quite a pleasant surprise for the residents of Orwell to hear of the marriage of one of the young men of Orwell to a young lady of the same place. A few of the young folks, noted for their graceful dancing, were present at the wedding. Some of the "boys" of the vicinity, serenaded the young couple with a lot of vigor and fog-horns.

The ice on the Orwell River is in a very unsafe condition. While fishing tom-cods yesterday, Mr. John Jos. McDonald broke through the ice, and after going down twice managed to get a firm hold of the ice and drew himself out. Fortunately for Mr. McDonald the tide was at a stand, and the current was not strong enough to draw him under the ice.

The celebration at Berlin on the 31st ult., of the anniversary of the birth of Prince Bismarck was an occasion of no little brilliancy. Military bands performed national and operatic selections before the residence of the Prince. The happy event was recognized by visits in person from Emperor William, many ladies of distinguished households, officers holding high rank at court, foreign ministers and other notables, who showered congratulations upon the Imperial chancery. Telegrams were received from places within the empire, as well as from points abroad, congratulating Prince Bismarck upon the occurrence of his 68th birthday, and there were numerous floral offerings which were displayed in the parlors of the Prince's residence.

A NEW WAY TO PAY OLD DEBTS.—To the State of Virginia belongs the palm for ingenious dishonesty. Some years ago it put a large amount of six per cent debentures upon the market. They met with a ready sale, and all the more so because the coupons were receivable in payment of State taxes. It has recently "refunded" this debt; that is it has compelled holders of the 6 per cents to accept a new issue bearing 3 per cent, has repealed the law authorizing the acceptance of the coupons for taxes, and the Supreme Court of the United States has declared the transaction legal.

That Leviathan of the deep, the "Great Eastern" has proved from the commencement a complete failure. At a meeting of the directors and proprietors in London, the other day, it was stated that the efforts to sell or charter the ship had been unavailing but unsuccessful. The income for the year consisted of transfer fees for \$1, interest, \$140; visitors' fees to ship, \$13, while the expenditure for the same period was \$1,402. It does not require much arithmetic to figure out where this sort of thing is to end.

In compliance with a request by the President, the members of the United States Cabinet have sent in their written views on the subject of the recent representations made by the British Minister in connection with the utterances of the Irish-American dynamite party. All the members of the Cabinet were unanimous in the opinion that in the existing state of affairs the United States Government would not be justified in interfering with the Irish sympathizers on this side of the Atlantic.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

TUESDAY, April 3.

The Bill to incorporate the Montague Hall Company passed the second reading. The Bill to incorporate the Orwell Head Church in connection with the Church of Scotland, was reported from Committee.

The Bill to incorporate the Sisters of Charity, of Charlottetown, was passed.

The Butter and Cheese Protection Bill was advanced a stage or two.

The Mill View Creamery Bill passed the second reading.

A message from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor was presented to the House with accompanying despatches from the Secretary of State, Ottawa, showing that the acts of the last session of the House of Assembly of this Province were approved.

A Bill relating to the registration of a certain Deed there recited, passed the second reading.

The Bill to incorporate the Herald Printing Company, also passed a second reading.

A Petition of the City Council of Charlottetown was presented by Hon. Mr. McLeod, setting forth that doubts have been cast on the borrowing powers conferred on the city by the Statute now in force, and in order to set at rest such doubts, and definitely to declare the meaning and intent of the said Statute they the City Council pray for the enactment of a declaratory Statute in relation thereto.

REV. JOHN MCKINNON has received the appointment to the Chair in Gaelic in Edinburgh University which was recently established through the exertions of Dr. Blackie. He was ordained at Hopewell, N. S., where he labored for some years, afterward removed to Georgetown, and has lately been employed as assistant to Dr. McLaughlin in the Free Church congregation at Edinburgh. His many friends in the Maritime Provinces will rejoice in his elevation, while all among us interested in literature and philological science will rejoice that one of our Island men has been chosen for such a position. In the circumstances it speaks well for his attainments, and we have no doubt he will fill the office with credit.
