Exciting Race Program Held

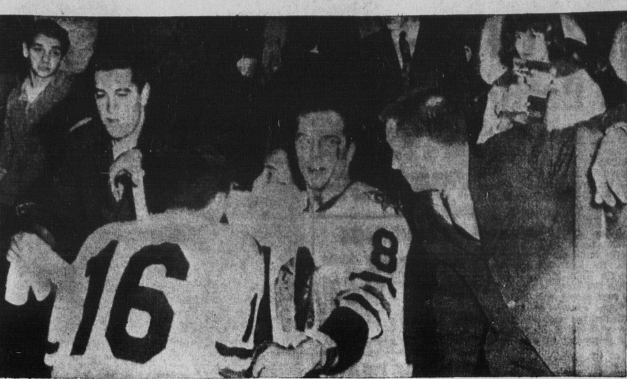

Maple Leafs Defeat Wings 5-3 For Perfect Weekend

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs made it a perfect weekend Sunday night by downing Detroit Red Wings 5-3 in National Hockey League play. The Leafs beat Chicago Black Hawks 3-0 Saturday.

Red Kelly, one of the "old boys" of the Leafs at 34, sparked them with a breakaway goal and two assists.

George Armstrong tied it for Detroit at 19:09 of the first period but the Leafs' goal in three games, regained the lead for Detroit at 1:50 of the second period and then set up the next two.

The victory was the fourth straight for Toronto and stretched the defending Stanley Cup champions unbeaten string to 10 games.

Claude Larofre gave Detroit a 1-0 lead at 15:47 of the first period on the fourth penalty shot of the National Hockey League season.

HAILED DOWN
Larofre was hauled down from behind by Toronto's Bob Baun before he could get his shot away. Larofre drilled his free shot just above ice level and between goalie Don Simmons' skates.

Then Kelly went to work, scoring himself and setting up Eddie Shack at 12:05 for the tie-breaker. Shack's shot took a white bounce past Detroit goalie Terry Sawchuk.

Toronto pushed its lead to 5-2 on goals by Dave Keon and Bob Nevin in the third period before Larry Jeffrey hit for Detroit to end the scoring.

Toronto boasted a 41-26 shooting edge and that just about was the margin of the Leafs' superiority throughout as Detroit

went down to its seventh defeat in 10 games.

The Wings, fighting a series of crippling injuries, have won only once in that span.

Defenceman Bill Gadsby worked two periods and had to quit because of a bad back that has sidelined him for three of the last four games and Sawchuk played with a bad back because no other goaltender was available.

Kelly's goal took the life out of Detroit and the redhead did it by outkicking ex-leaf Johnny MacMillan, purchased from Toronto last week by Detroit.

Kelly got the puck in a scramble at the Toronto blue line with MacMillan a stride behind him. Kelly maintained his lead and fired high over Sawchuk's left shoulder for the goal.

Sawchuk made three rapid-fire saves on Carl Brewer, Roy Stewart and Shack as the prelude to Shack's goal. He held Shack's shot for a facemask and Kelly went to work with the puck going to shack.

CHICAGO (CP) — Chicago Black Hawks dumped Montreal firmly into third place Sunday night by blanking the Canadiens 3-0 in a National Hockey League game here.

Goalie Glenn Hall recorded his fourth shutout of the season.

Hall, last year's Vezina Trophy winner, had a comparatively easy time in the close-checking match, coming up with 26 saves, as did Charlie Hodge in the Montreal nets.

By winning their 16th game of the season, the Hawks boosted their hold on the league lead to eight points over Toronto, which moved into second ahead of the Canadiens by beating Detroit 5-3 Sunday night.

Chicago is unbeaten in 14 games on Stadium ice. There have been two ties.
