AN Austrian named Antonio Curio, was to day sentenced to eight days imprisonment for vagrancy.

It is reported that 33,000 Jewish colonists will be driven off the Crown lands of Russia, because they don't engage in Agriculture.

JOHN W. MORRISON, Esq., Clerk of Public Works Department, who has been ill for some days, is, we are glad to learn, somewhat better to day.

The regular meeting of the Catholic Literary Union will take place in St. Patrick's Hall, on Wednesday evening, March 15, at 8 o'clock.

We are informed by E. J. Cundall, Esq., that the thermometer during the white frost of Sunday morning last fell to 11 degrees below zero.

The coast of Newfoundland is beleaguered with large quantities of floating ice, and navigation in those waters is therefore rendered exceedingly dangerous.

EXTENSIVE robberies of money letters have been discovered in the Montreal Post-office, and one of the clerks has been arrested. Ample evidence of his guilt was secured.

We regret to learn that Mr. Blanchard, of the law firm of Payfield & Blanchard, met with a serious accident to his eyes to-day. He will probably be confined to his hotel for some days to come.

A PRIVATE letter from Winnipeg says that the wife for two nights was compelled to sleep (or attempt to sleep) in a chair in an hotel, for which he was charged fifty cents per night. Positions on the floor were selling at a premium.

A LETTER received from Mgr. Lafache, Bishop of Three Rivers, Que., who is still in Rome, intimates that it is the intention of the Pope to send a Papal Delegate to Canada. His Holiness however has not yet decided who will fill this high office.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY EXCURSION.—Return tickets at one and one-third first class fare will be issued from all stations on the Railway to Charlottetown on Friday, the 17th inst., good to return on the following day.

THE Grocery Store of James Byrne, Esq., Great George Street, was, last night, entered from the rear, by burglars. A quantity of groceries, and a large amount of cents and silver were stolen therefrom. The burglars escaped without being detected. They are as yet unknown.

THE storm was very severe over the Railway line to-day, and therefore all trains are held at terminal stations until it abates. The train which left Summerside for this city at 3.30 this morning, got stuck after running a quarter of a mile. An engine was sent to tow her back to Summerside. It is not likely any trains will be moved to-day.

If the tunnel which it is proposed to build across the English Channel should cost \$50,000,000, which was one of the estimates, it would take 1,000,000 passengers at \$2.50 each to pay five per cent. on the investment. Of course, there must be an allowance for freight, but no estimate has been made of the possible business of this nature.

A BUST of Sir John Macdonald, by Mr. Dunbar, has been placed in the library of the Ontario Legislature, alongside of that of the late Senator Brown. It is proposed that the two busts shall be permanently placed in positions above the two closets at the southern end of the room, and possibly others will from time to time be added to the collection.

THE Russian Official Gazette publishes a report upon the conscription for 1881. The number of those liable to military service was 779,000, about 15,000 less than the previous year. Originally the contingent was fixed at 235,000, but it was afterward reduced by a decree of the Emperor to 212,000. The recruits taken numbered 210,106. The defaulters amounted to thirty-one per cent. of Jews and three per cent. of Christians.
