

### Rotary Speaker Urges Change of Viewpoint

"Since the labor-saving, pleasure-producing, status-affirming symbols and gadgets are available, modern man wants his share of them, but they harbor strong connotations which have had a little more leisure without quite so much pleasure-producing, and a little more meaning without quite so much struggle for status," Dr. C. Ritchie Bell, former moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and professor of pastoral theology at Presbyterian College, Montreal, declared in an address before the Luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Dr. Bell said that "we see things not as they are but as we are and make a plea for a change of viewpoint on the part of the average man. We are masters of our own fate more commonly than we recognize. We can select the spirit in which we meet whatever may happen to us."

Dr. Bell said that "we need to cultivate the viewpoint of Jesus Christ" and suggested that "in other religion is confused with being sad, sombre and solemn, having more to do with grief and death than with joy."

"Beyond this lies a persistent, undiscouraged friendliness. No hostility could spoil Jesus' friendliness. His durable good will, no hatred caused Him to retaliate."

"If we are to live with the kind of viewpoint the Master displayed, we must hold that this is a good world," Dr. Bell claimed that this was the great contribution of the church in these times.

"The times are dark—the times are tedious and man is weak. But the times have been dark before, the sins are not beyond redemption, and God is strong. To say that this is a good world is not to infer that this is a perfect world. Plenty of harmful, horrid, hurtful things can happen still. It is God's world and as we hold to this viewpoint it shapes and colors our everyday existence."

### No Agreement Is Reached On Holman's I.

SUMMERSIDE — Officials of this town and representatives of the Lower Beedee School District met at town hall last evening to discuss the controversial Holman's Island situation but failed to come to an understanding after more than an hour's debate.

The town plans to expropriate the island to use it as a sewage lagoon, but the Beedee School District aims that the Legislature extend the borders of the Town of Summerside to include the island and that the Legislature or negotiations in regard to loss of assessment by the school district.

Members of the town council are reported to feel that the Beedee district will benefit just as much as Summerside and St. Eleonors from a pollution-free harbor and that shore property values will be greatly increased, thus making up in increased assessed values for any temporary loss of taxes at the present time by inclusion of Holman's Island in the Summerside boundaries.

A very brief statement was given by the two groups following their more than hour-long meeting, which was termed "private and closed to the press."

### Alma Paraplegic Cans Struggle Against Odds

It's been a rough road these past three years for Carl Profit, a 46-year-old Alma man who recently opened up a service station in that community. Mr. Profit became a paraplegic in September, 1960, as a result of an accident in a Tignish street.

"From a medical point of view, we believe that only his determination to get up on his feet brought him along to his present condition."

While he was undergoing this treatment Mr. Profit was very impatient to return to work, in spite of the fact that he was being looked after with medical expenses and salary paid by the Workmen's Compensation Board.

WANTED STATION In spite of his handicap—he is a paraplegic with no feeling in his feet, although he can walk with them for short distances—Mr. Profit had a strong desire to build and operate a service station. His tenacity and faith, coupled with the help he received from the Community Action Board, Texaco Co. of Canada, and the Bank of Commerce in Alberton, enabled him to realize his ambition.

Carl Profit is now running an Alma service station in Alma with the help of his wife and his large family. He has turned a tragedy into a success story.
