However, it is understood that under the terms of the new fund, there would be a rebate of 25 per cent of the cost of such undertakings as planned here.

Another Summerside resident, appearing in town police court pleaded not guilty to a similar charge and his case was adjourned until Oct. 7.

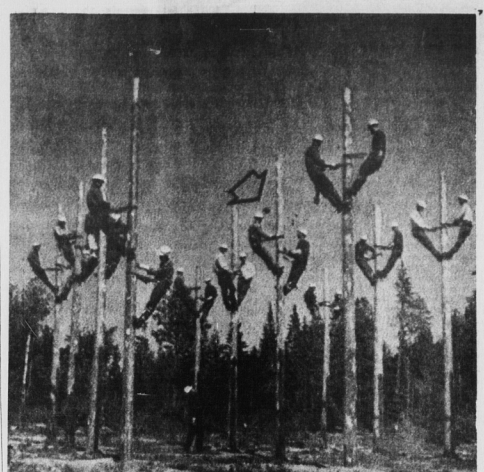
