Discusses Motor Accidents At Laymen's Meeting

Two persons were killed and 27 were sent to hospital in this province during the month of November as a result of motor vehicle accidents," P. W. Barlow provincial examiner, Motor Vehicle Branch told the members of St. Paul's Laymen's Association at their monthly supper meeting last evening. There were 63 accidents, most of them of a minor nature, on which an estimated property damage was given in excess of \$25,000.

While the number of accidents recorded in October was lower than in November, the estimated property damage was almost \$17,000, or a total for the two months of approximately \$42,000.

"Fifty eight per cent of all accidents are attributed to inattention," Mr. Barlow said. "A driver knows the road, he knows his car and unfortunately permits his mind to wander. Alert driving at all times is essential if accidents are to be curtailed. The objective of a total absence of accidents, is unfortunately unattainable. Four per cent of accidents are attributed to drunken driving."

Mr. Barlow explained the various causes of motor accidents which he said every motorist was familiar with, but in the main ignored in the hope that it "can't happen to me."

A car driving at 50 miles per hour travels 75 ft. per second and takes nearly 200 feet to be braked to a stop. Mr. Barlow urged the adult motorist to try to forget the careless habits formed in "picking up

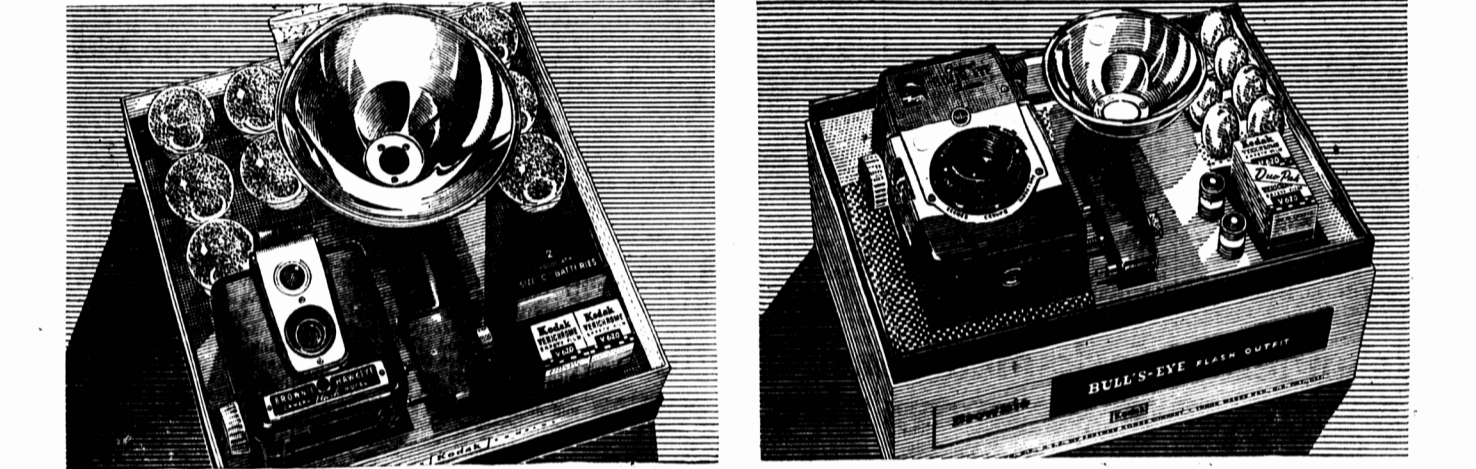
