CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

West North East South

1 ♠ Pass 2 ♠ ?

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠ KJ972 ♣ Q ♢ AK3 ♣ J98

2. ♠ AK73 ♣ 5 ♢ QJ964 ♣ K83

3. ♠ AQJ9663 ♣ 7 ♢ QJ82 ♣ 3

4. ♠ K5 ♣ K796 ♣ AQ754 ♣ 5

1. Pass. There's no use knocking your head against a stone wall. It is fair to assume that West, for his bid, has about 14 points, and that East, for his response, has about 10 points. This doesn't leave much for partner to have, and he may well have a hand you wouldn't wish on anybody.

To bid two spades, or double for takeout, would be wrong under the circumstances. The roof could cave in if you look either action, and your partner might not take kindly to the beating that could follow if you got doubled: You have a good hand, all right — in fact, an opening bid — but you can't turn a deaf ear to what the opponents are clearly saying.

2. Double. Of course, the same sentiments about partner having a poor hand apply here

also, but the difference is that now you have distributional values in addition to high cards, and there is a possibility of competing successfully against the opponents despite their high-card strength.

Thus your partner may have:

and it would be worthwhile playing the hand at four spades, going down one or two, instead of letting the opponents play at four hearts, which they would very likely make.

3. Four spades. You don't really expect to make four spades — though you might if partner had exactly the right hand. The chief purpose of the bid is to interfere with enemy communications as that they cannot exchange further information at a low level. Very often this strategy succeeds and the opponents either double prematurely or else wind up in the wrong contract.

4. Pass. Here also, as in the first hand, you take your medicine and pass. The 15 high-card points you started with have shrunk quite a bit in size. Your KJ of hearts in front of the heart bidder are worth much less than they were before the bidding started, and the same is more or less true about your other high cards. By all means, pass

Unions Suggest Changes In Que. Forest Control

QUEBEC (CP)—The Quebec-based Confederation of National Trade Unions "said here Quebec's forests should, in five or 10 years, become Crown possessions administered by a provincial agency.

The statement was made in a brief to a public hearing held by the Quebec lands and forests department prior to drawing up new forest legislation.

Rene Cormier, general secretary of the CNTU-affiliated Canadian Federation of Pulp and Paper Workers, said his organization thinks wood could be produced more cheaply by a government-controlled agency than by private companies which now control the cutting operations of Quebec's forests.

Mr. Cormier, who presented the CNTU brief, said complaints made by pulp and paper companies about the high cost of wood proves that the present arrangement for control of forests is not ideal.

Opposition to changes in Quebec's system of woods concessions came from Price Bros. and Co. Ltd., and Consolidated Paper Corp. Ltd.

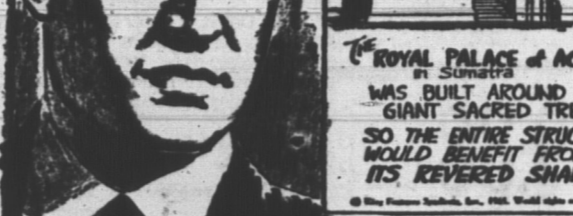
Both warned against any measures that would hamper, through higher prices, Quebec's exports of wood products. Such a development would worsen the province's competitive situation.

The Consolidated Paper brief said the firm has insufficient forest concessions now, and that uncertainty about future wood supplies should be given consideration.

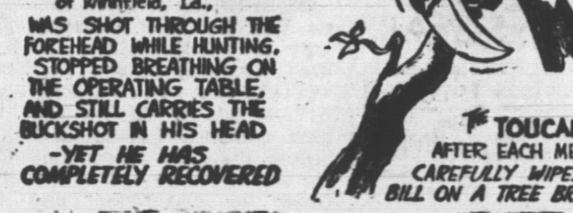
The company said the development of forest concessions should remain the immediate responsibility of the enterprise controlling the concession but with a still more adequate control on the part of the government.

The Price Bros. brief said it many-sided forest development but that this is made expensive by present laws.

OTTAWA (CP)—Some Ottawa public school pupils apparently have a good thing going for them on the black market.

Public school board officials have learned that students were selling free bus tickets provided by the board—and walking to school.

The board gives out \$40,000 worth of bus tickets from December to March to students living more than a mile and a half from school. Trustee Daniel Kelly suggested the Ottawa Transportation Commission should issue passes, instead of tickets, to stop this little black market.
