Much Satisfaction Regarding Bloemfontein.

Anxiety About Baden-Powell and Mafeking.

Canadians on the Move—War Loan Subscribed Ten Times Over—Great Britain will not Accept Mediation—The Boers in a Tight Place.

PLUMER'S PROGRESS.

CAPETOWN, March 14.—Colonel Plumer occupied Lubat-i without opposition, March 5. The Boers retired on the previous day, leaving the railway damaged, but easily repaired.

CANADIANS MOVING.

CAPETOWN, March 14.—Canadians from Victoria West have proceeded to the Prieska district.

UNCONFIRMED.

LONDON, March 14.—At midnight, in the lobby of the House of Commons, rumors that Mafeking had been relieved were in circulation; but these lack confirmation.

ANXIETY ABOUT MAFEKING.

LONDON, March 14.—While there is much satisfaction expressed over the reported arrival of General French's column in Bloemfontein, there is, on the other hand, much keen anxiety respecting the safety of Baden-Powell and Mafeking.

This anxiety has been growing rapidly during the last few days, culminating yesterday when several disquieting telegrams were received.

There is but one gleam of hope about Mafeking, and that is that several messages have got out of the town in one way or another.

THE WAR LOAN.

LONDON, March 14.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer announced yesterday that the War Loan was over-subscribed ten times, the applications numbering 18,000.

NO MEDIATION.

LONDON, March 14.—Great Britain will accept no offer of mediation, nor will she deal with the Boer Republics through any third party.

When the Boers have laid down their arms and surrendered, and when the British flag floats over both capitals, then, and not till then, will the terms of peace be discussed.

This determination of Her Majesty's

Government represents the feeling which prevails the entire Empire.

Lord Salisbury's declaration, yesterday, sounded the death knell of the independence of the Transvaal and Orange Free State.

Their future existence will be as colonies of the Crown.

The appeal of Presidents Kruger and Steyn to the Powers for intervention has fallen upon unheeding ears. From the capitals of Europe there is no response.

BOERS BETWEEN TWO FIRES.

LONDON, March 14.—The Boers may make another fight, but there is little doubt that Lord Roberts will occupy Bloemfontein to-day—Wednesday.

The Boers retiring from Orange River will find themselves between two British armies, and their guns are almost all bound to fall into the hands of the British, while the British occupation of the Free State capital will strain the alliance of the two republics to the utmost.

AN EXPLANATION.

SIR.—The presentation of a New Testament to each of the Contingent for South Africa, on last Monday evening, was made by me on behalf of the Auxiliary Bible Society, at the request of the President, ex Mayor Dawson, who was unable to attend. It was a small Morocco-bound book, weighing less than five ounces and could easily be carried in the breast-pocket of a soldier, where it might be a protection to his heart in more ways than one (see Proverbs: 4 ch. 23 v) This presentation preceded those of the gold. A similar present was made by the Bible Society to the first Contingent.
