## Inquest Conducted In Highway Death

Miss Ruby Munroe, 17, of Glace Bay, N.S., came to her death at approximately 8:20 p.m. Nov. 26, 1965, about a half mile west of Kensington as the result of an automobile accident in which she sustained internal injuries.

This was the findings of a coroner's jury which held an inquest into the death of Ruby Munroe at city hall last night. The inquest was conducted by Dr. C. A. Cosdy, coroner for Queens County.

Dr. L. K. Zielinski of Kensington testified that he was summoned to the scene on the night of Nov. 26 moments after the collision occurred. He examined the girl who was previously pinned underneath a 1959 model Plymouth and pronounced her dead.

The doctor said death was caused by internal injury and hemorrhage.

The autopsy, performed 18 hours later by Dr. Andres Aquino, provincial pathologist, revealed that the main causes of death were as follows: disloca-

tion and fracture of the upper portion of the neck, swelling of the brain, fluid from the stomach breathed into the lungs and bleeding of the lungs.

**DRIVER TESTIFIES**

Gary Thomas Dunphy, 20, of Kensington driver of the car in which the deceased was a passenger, said that he and four other passengers were proceeding from Kensington to Summerside about 8 p.m. Nov. 26, 1965, when the automobile went off onto the shoulder of the road in an attempt to regain the highway the car veered and went sideways over the white line.

In an instant the car was struck by another vehicle proceeding in the opposite direction which resulted in the Dunphy car being forced into the ditch.

The witness said the automobile came to rest on Ruby who was thrown out and pinned her beneath.

Other passengers in the car, Leslie James Baldwin, 19, Glace Bay; Gerald Winston Mann, 17, and Frank Perry, both of Kensington, attempted to lift the car from the victim but could not.

Driver of the other vehicle involved in the accident was Ronald Patrick McGrath, 19, of Hunter River. He testified that he was proceeding home from Summerside when he met the 1959 Plymouth which swerved an instant before impact.

**HIGHWAY WET**

The witness, driving a 1965 model Ford, said he was travelling between 30-40 miles per hour and that the highway was wet as it had been raining and snowing off and on during the evening.

After the collision occurred, he said he left for Kensington to get an ambulance.

Cat. Walter S. Pineau, Kensington detachment of the RCMP, said he arrived at the scene to find the Plymouth partly in the ditch and the other car on the right side of the highway.

There were people beside the Plymouth where a girl was covered with blankets and a coat he said.

Constable Pineau introduced drawing he made at the accident scene which depicted the position of the cars and included measurements.

"markets throughout the country (U.S.A.) continue firm generally in mostly all sections, with some areas reporting higher prices with a good demand... In the East markets are generally firm and higher... in Maine reports indicate growers are holding tight and dealers were getting low on supplies."

#### EAST HOLDINGS DOWN

Maine is often regarded as one of the strongest of the American states so far as competition for P.E.I. and New Brunswick spuds are concerned. Holdings there are down 4,000 hundredweights from January 1 of last year and the holdings for the eight Eastern fall states are also down.

But holdings in the nine central and nine western fall states are up by a large margin. Cold storage holdings of "frozen French fries" also are up sharply. The 304 million pounds reported this month compares with only 223 million at the same time a year ago.

#### MARITIME STORAGE

Storage holdings of potatoes in three Maritime Provinces TABB indicates are down 2.2 million hundredweights.

Shipments of spuds out of the Maritime Provinces, the Canada department of agriculture report indicates, are down 2,876 carloads from the same period a year ago.

The CDA report dated Jan. 14 reveals that potato shipments from P.E.I. from the current crop year are down 1,147 car-

loads from shipments up to Jan. 14 a year ago.

New Brunswick shipments of 5,216 carloads are down 1,721 carloads from a year ago.

The total production from the 1965 crop, though, is down considerably in both provinces.

### SIR JOHN A. HOME SAVED

TORONTO (CP) — Sir John A. Macdonald's former city home was saved from demolition at the last minute by a non-partisan venture to turn the home into a national shrine honoring the Fathers of Confederation.

Toronto's Board of Control had voted to hand the 126-year-old house to the Toronto Parking Authority to be torn down and made into a parking lot.

However, E.A. Goodman, Toronto lawyer and prominent Conservative party member, appeared before the board with plans to incorporate a Fathers of Confederation Historical Foundation. He told

the board the house in which Sir John lived for more than a year would become a museum filled with authentic relics and furnishings of Confederation.

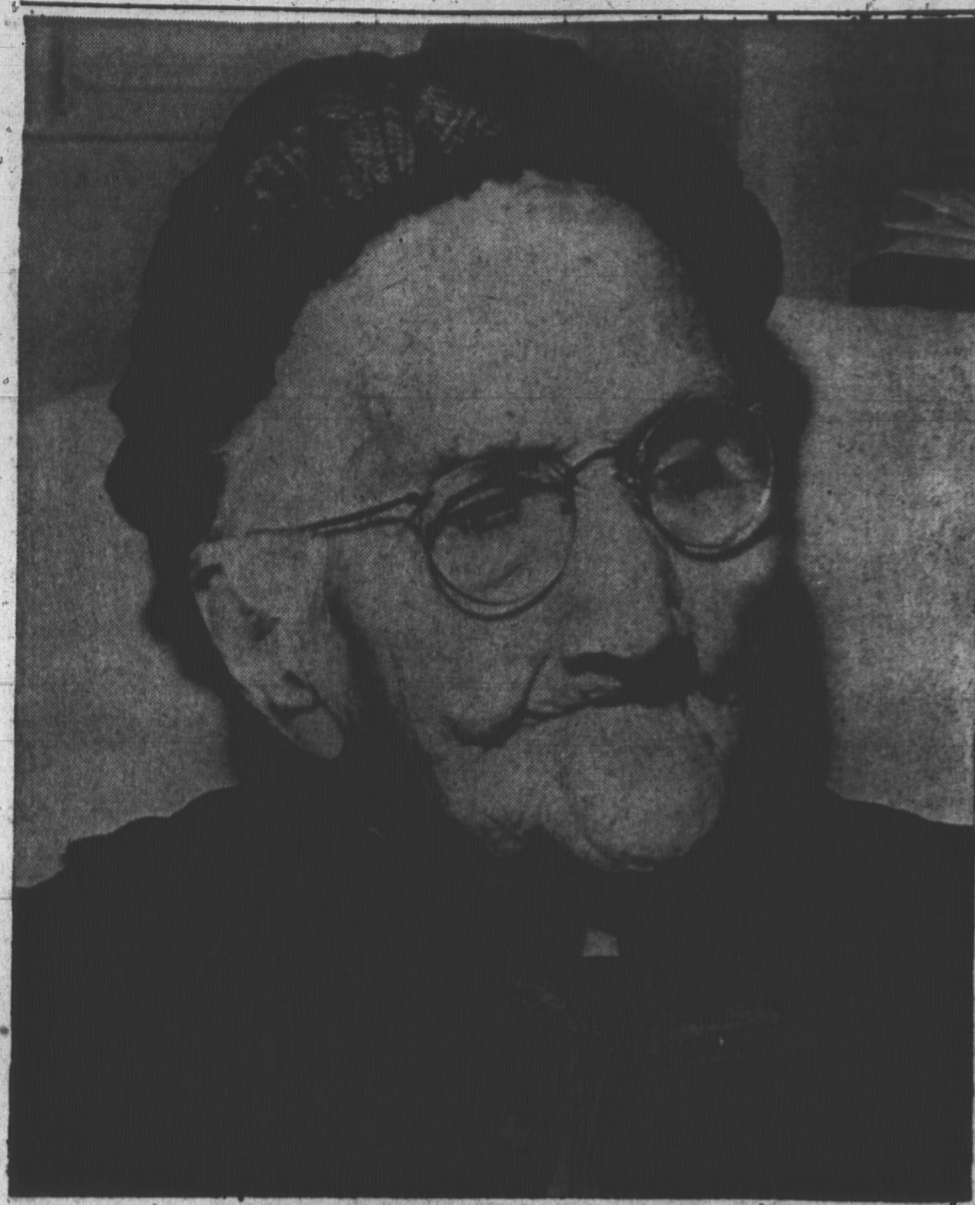
Mr. Goodman said he would canvass private business to raise \$250,000 needed for the plan. The museum later would be operated by the Toronto Historical Board, he said.

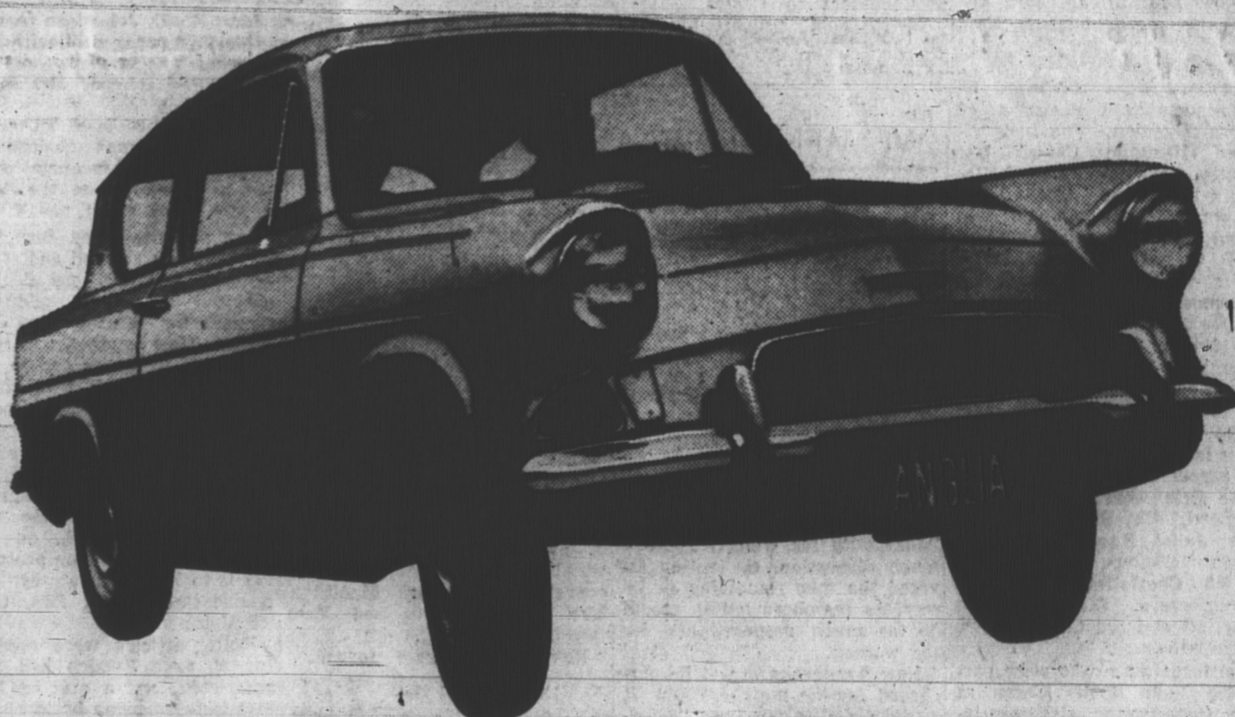
