Governor Towers Visits Prince County Capital

Expressing a firm and confident belief in the inherent strength of the economy of the Western Nations in general and Canada in particular, Mr. Graham Towers, governor of the Bank of Canada spoke briefly to a luncheon gathering of Summerside business men in the Olympia Restaurant yesterday. He reviewed the economic policies of the central bank since its institution and said that Canada came out of the war better off than most countries and that five years after the end of the war there is still no sign of depression. He expressed confidence that the conditions of the 30's will not return.

The luncheon was under the auspices of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau and the director of the Bureau, Brigadier W. W. Reid presided and introduced the guest of honor. A civic welcome was extended by His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge, who said he regretted that Mr. Towers and his party could spend so little time in "Eastern Canada's busiest town." He felt that if they stayed longer they would probably consider the establishment of a branch of the Bank of Canada here.

In his opening remarks Mr. Towers said that the last time he visited this Province, 12 years ago, he was in the company of the late Mr. J. LeRoy Holman, who was a director of the Bank of Canada for 13 years up to the time of his death. He stated that Mr. Holman was held in high esteem by all the directors both personally and in a business way. Also in the party were Mr. E. J. Tarr of Winnipeg and Mr. A. Pickard of Charlottetown, directors, and Mr. C. H. Richardson, Ottawa, deputy secretary of the Bank of Canada.
