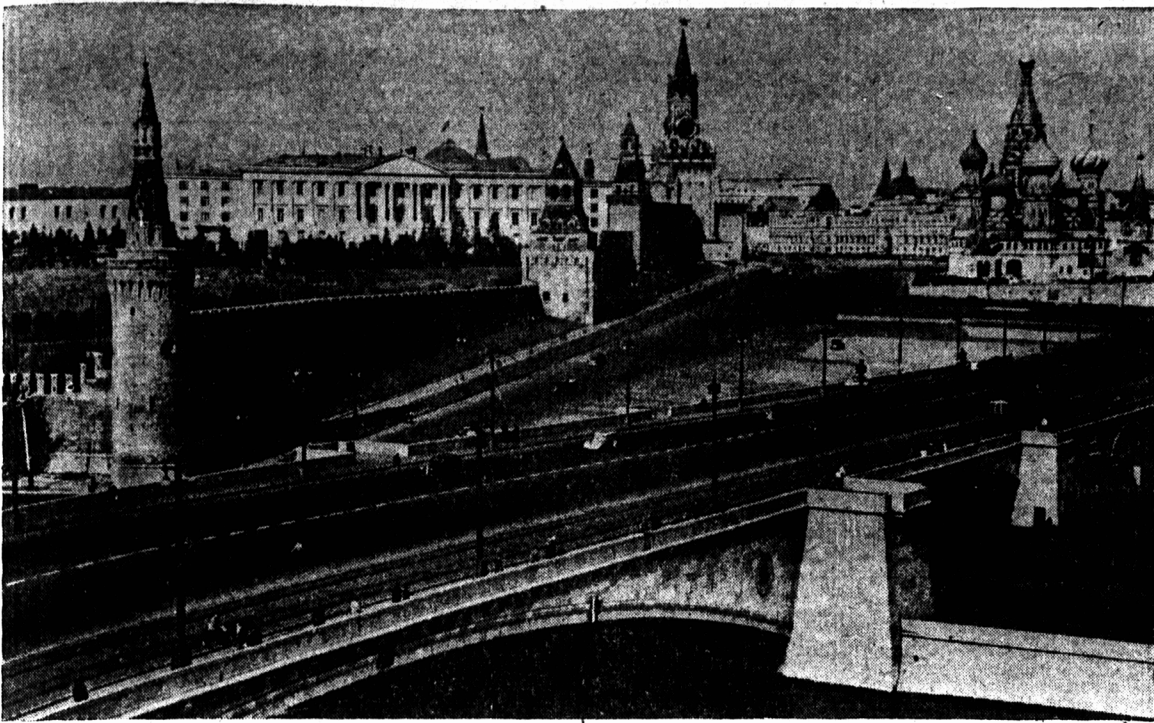


Communism's Second Great Leader Lies In State Near Lenin's Grave

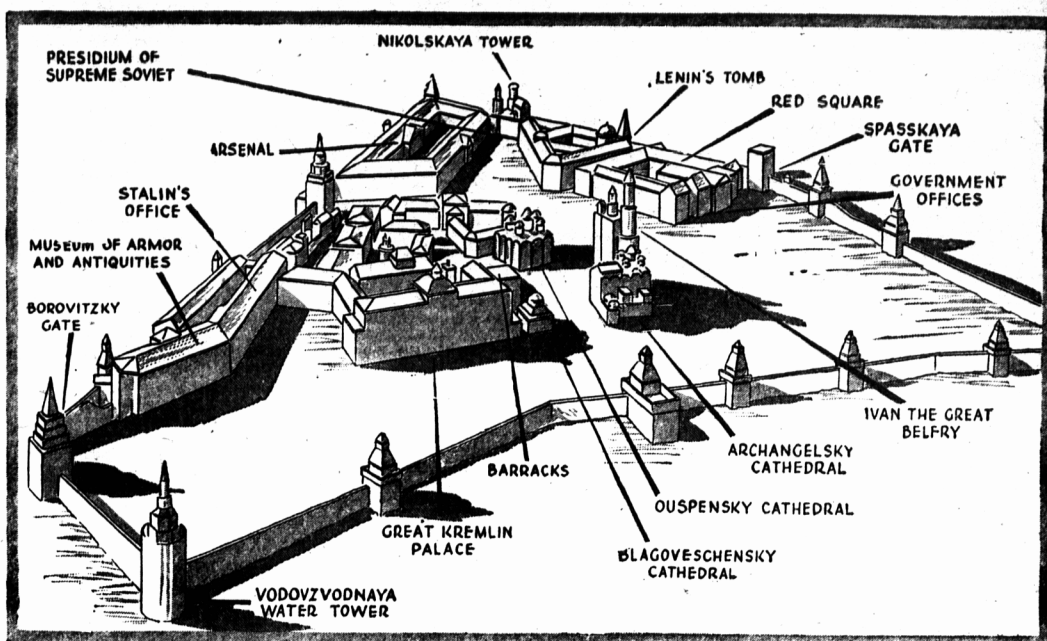
CLYDE RIVER W. I.
