School Closings At Summerside, Alberton

Graduation exercises of St. Mary's Academy, Summerside, were held last night in St. Paul's Church for the senior grades and were largely attended by members of the parish and the parents of the children. Prizes were awarded to the senior grades, the junior grades having received theirs at the exercises held in the morning. The prizes were presented by Rt. Rev. G. J. MacLellan, V.G., who in his address to the graduates and children of the other grades said that it had been a splendid year.

Mr. Stewart, in his opening remarks, extended his congratulations to the graduates and wished them every success. He commended the action of the Mayor and Town Council in providing a new playground for the children of the town.

Mr. Mercer extended his thanks to all organizations who had helped the school during the year in any way. He said that during the year two new courses had been inaugurated, a commercial course and a technical course. He explained that the introduction of these courses is based on the fact that the aptitudes of all pupils are not alike.

He expressed the opinion that in addition to matriculation there should be a leaving school certificate at grades 10 or 11 of more general nature. He thought that in two or three years more the people of the town should prepare for the possibility of the need for erecting a new school building.

At the closing of the Alberton High School last evening the Governor General's Bronze Medal was awarded to Dorothy Bonyman. The closing exercises were held in the Women's Institute Hall with Rev. J. F. McMahon as chairman. A very large number of interested parents and friends were in attendance.

"O Canada" opened the program and Morley Coffin and Peggy Millman welcomed the audience. A chorus of primary pupils, a recitation by Trudy and Marilyn Harvie and a solo by Stephanie Larter preceded the presentation of prizes and certificates to the primary pupils.

The "Island Hymn" was sung by grades three and four, after which a recitation by Connie Rose McKinnon, piano selections by pupils of grades three and four, a dainty song by Nancy Smith, a dance by Denise Thibault and a "Good-Bye Song," by the boys of these grades were enjoyed. Pupils of these two grades then received their awards.

S' side Air Cadets Receive Recognition

A member of Summerside Air Cadet Squadron has been selected for the international drill team and four cadets have been given scholarship for flying training at Moncton, N. B.

Sgt. Kenneth Perry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Perry who has been selected for the International Drill Team will go to Greenwood Air Station on July 16th. Sixty cadets from the four Atlantic Provinces will assemble there and will go through a period of intensive training in precision drill. During the training about fifteen will be eliminated, cutting the team to about 45 cadets.

The team will leave for Toronto on August 26th to represent Canada in the International Drill competition for the Major General Beau Trophy. They will compete against a team from the U.S. Civil Air Patrol and possibly a team from Britain.

They will attend a course given by the Moncton Flying Club which commences on July 9th and will last 17 hours during which they will complete the course successfully they will be awarded the Air Cadet Flying Wing. If they wish they may stay on for a period at their own expense and obtain their private pilot's license.

C.C.F. Meeting At Alberton

Mr. Donald C. MacDonald, National Treasurer of the C. C. F. was the special speaker at a meeting in the Alberton Court House last night in connection with the annual C. C. F. National expansion drive. The spokesman reported that issues such as living costs are renewing interest across the country. Ever since the close of the war the C. C. F. has insisted on the retention of price controls as the only way of holding living costs in check.

After six years of consolidating our position in Canada the C. C. F. now is building its organization to capitalize on the swing to our party, the speaker said. "We are on the eve of another march forward similar to that ten years ago when the C. C. F. suddenly emerged as the official opposition in Ontario and the government in Saskatchewan."

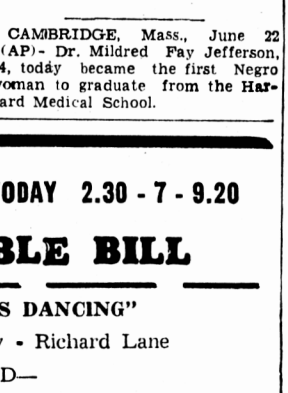

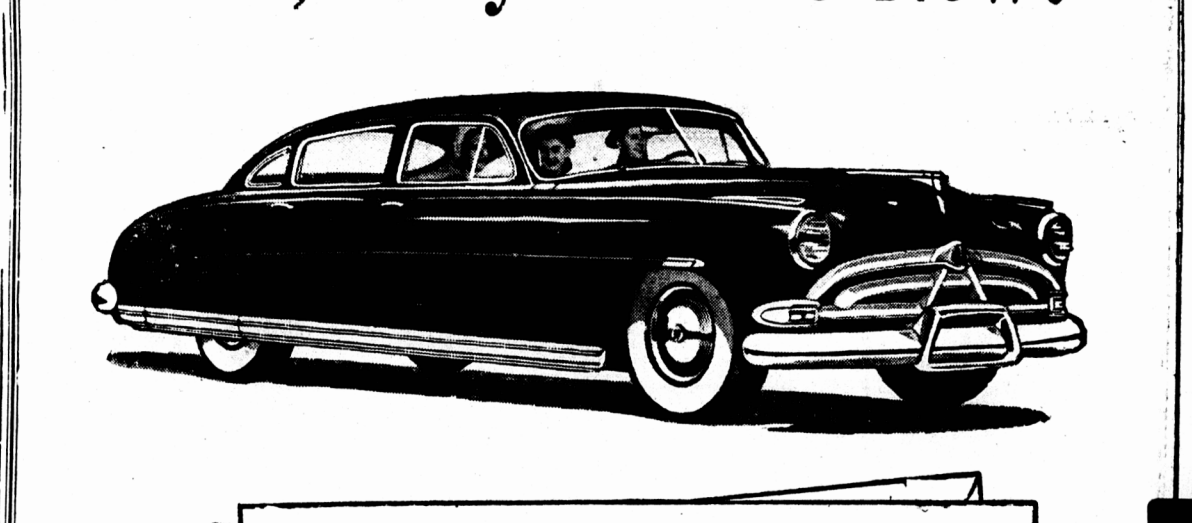
