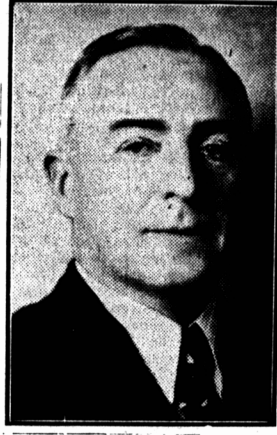
The payments of bonds and mortgage was also discussed. Most were in favor of paying off as many of the bonds each year as possible.

OTTAWA (CP) — Quebec Aces, facing elimination in the seventh game of their best-of-nine Quebec Hockey League final, prolonged the series Monday night with a 4-3 overtime victory over Ottawa Senators. The Quebec win cut Ottawa's series lead to 4-3 in games.

Buddy Boone, a ball of fire for the Aces throughout this series, broke up the game after six minutes and 48 seconds of overtime. He took a pass from defenceman Butch Houle at the Quebec blue-line, stick-handled in close and beat goalie Ray Frederick.

The winning goal was Boone's second of the night. He scored his first in the second period. Other Quebec scorers were Houle and Ludger Tremblay.

Jackie Giesebrucht, Bill Johnson and Gordie Hudson countered for the losers, Hudson's goal coming with 10 seconds of regulation time to go to tie up the game.

Frontenacs Tie Series

QUEBEC (CP) — The fired Quebec Frontenacs defeated Catharines TeeFees 5-2 Monday night in an action-packed game featured by a pier-six-type brawl. The result tied the eastern Canada Memorial Cup final at a game apiece.

The Frontenacs were on top from the start, grabbing a 3-0 lead in the opening frame which took an hour and 10 minutes to play. Total of 6,424 fans were on hand. Scoring was distributed among seven players. Mike Ratchford, Stan Parker, Gilles Thibault, Richard Bouchard and Guy Rousseau were the Quebec marksmen. Chester Warchol and Hugh Barlow counted for St. Catharines.

Ex-Islanders Hub Beaudry, who suffered a fractured ankle while playing for the Sudbury Wolves against the Matane Red Rocks in the Eastern Canada Allan Cup play-offs, will be out of action for the remainder of the season.

Beaudry centered for Nick Tomluk and Pete Horeck during the latter part of the year. Hub enjoyed a great season with the Wolves, and as he did here, proved very popular with the fans. Pete Horeck suffered a foot injury during the game in which Beaudry was sidelined.

Nearly all hockey observers outside the Province of Quebec were surprised by the showing of the Red Rocks against Sudbury. The Lower St. Lawrence River League, in which Matane played throughout the season, is poorly publicized in English speaking regions. We hadn't heard anything about the League until Gerard LaChance and Bill LeLanc landed here from Montreal last December. Even before their arrival here the League was given nearly every handle except the right one.

The Matane team wasn't a club of home brew hockey players. They were play-for-pay men some of whom claimed they had to look at a map to locate Matane last fall. Gerry Piamondon, playing coach of the Red Rocks, played with the Montreal Canadiens for about six years. Prior to that he played with Pittsburgh in the American League and after leaving the Canadiens he played for two seasons with the Montreal Royals in the Q.S.H.L. He was signed to a \$7,000 contract by Matane last fall.

Two other players, winger Bob Leger and defenseman Bernie Lamoques played with Shawinigan Falls Cataracts in the Q.S.H.L. last season. The Red Rocks goalie was Marcel Paille who played at the Forum with the Quebec Citadelles last winter in an exhibition game against the Islanders. They have a fellow named Roger Leduc who has been playing hockey for two decades and who still tests around like a youngster. Here's his hockey record: Valleyfield, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Valleyfield, Victoriaville, Valleyfield, Pembroke, Lachine Rapids, Riviere Du Loup and now Matane.

Matane was missing defenseman Leon Bouchard for the play-offs. Evidently Bouchard quit the Matane Club after the regular league schedule on account of a salary dispute. He had played with Edmonton and Victoria in the W.H.L. before coming to Matane and in the Quebec centre was the bright-eyed boy with the fans. Matane very probably could have defeated Sudbury with him in the lineup.

The Wolves averaged crowds of well over 5,000 during the NOHA schedule and play-offs. They cleared \$18,000 for the campaign. Their payroll was the second highest in the NOHA at \$2400 a week. In this department they were second to Johnny O'Faherty's Sioux Ste. Marie paid out \$4,000 a week. Their payroll was the highest in Ontario outside the Maple Leafs.

Sudbury was one of the few teams to show a profit in the League. A number of the other clubs broke about even while others like the North Bay Trappers dropped \$12,000 on League operations. One team, the Sarnia Sailors, dropped out of the League in December on account of financial difficulties. The Owen Sound Mercurys operated in a smart way letting the players split the gate receipts among themselves. They didn't lose any money but they didn't win any titles although they had a good club.

Gordie Hunter, Calgary Herald Sports Editor, recently paid a nice compliment to former Glace Bay coach Bud Poile. Here it is: "Bud Poile skates like a snail on its knees. He's got a couple of gimpy legs and his wind reminds you of an aged Tony Galento. These facts alone have sent many puck-chasers to the scrap yard but not Mr. Poile. On the credit side of the ledger Poile can list these assets: the hardest shot in the Western Hockey League; a play-making ability that has not rusted with his skating and last, but by no means least, an inspirational leadership that can lift a no-better-than mediocre Edmonton team to great heights."

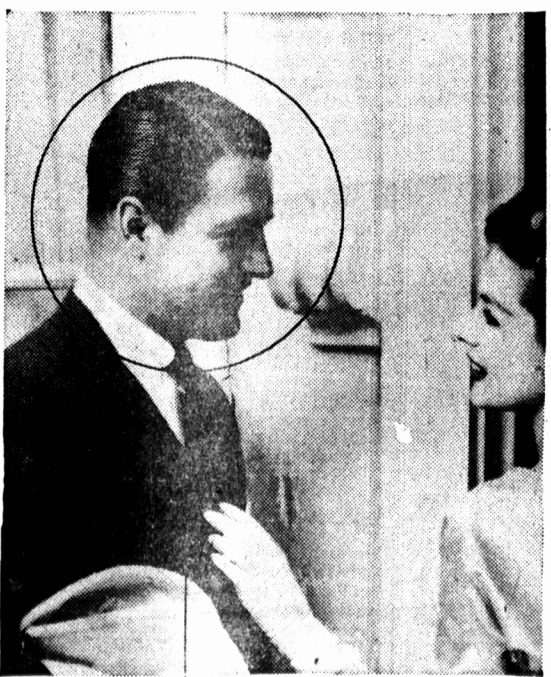
