OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker expressed disappointment Thursday night that a summit conference apparently will not be held until the spring.

"It had been the hope of the Canadian government that the summit meeting would take place at an earlier date than now contemplated," he said in a national television address.

"Delay could carry the risk of losing the benefit of the improved atmosphere which resulted from (Soviet Premier) Khrushchev's visit to the United States."

There have been indications in recent weeks that the projected heads-of-government meeting among Britain, France, the U.S. and Russia will not take place until next spring. Canada had hoped it would be held this fall.

Mr. Diefenbaker spoke on the CBC's free-time political program, The Nation's Business.

A text of the speech was issued to the press before delivery.

In a general review of the world situation, the prime minister said that while there is evidence of relaxed tension it is not sufficient to justify basic changes in Western policies.

"There is still no sign of a fundamental alteration in Soviet objectives, and it remains to be seen whether the Soviet Union can be induced to modify its basic positions on major issues. We want peace, but its attainment will not be advanced by appeasement or complacency or divided councils."

Discussions between East and West must be continued, he said. There had been encouraging indications that the Soviet Union is prepared to negotiate seriously on ending of nuclear tests under international control, as well as on disarmament and the peaceful uses of outer space.

Canada had demonstrated the great importance it attaches to disarmament by appointing Lt.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns as government disarmament adviser.

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

The bidding:  
East South West North  
1♦ 1♣ Pass 4♠

Opening lead — seven of diamonds.

The declarer has an advantage over the defenders because he sees every one of the 26 cards held by his side. As a result, he knows precisely what high cards he is missing. He likewise knows more about the distribution of the hand because he can see exactly how many cards of each suit each side has.

The defenders labor under a handicap since each of them can see only his own hand and dummy's. They do not know what their combined high cards and

distribution consist of, nor can they tell where declarer is weak or strong.

The situation would be sad for the defenders if it were not that various means are available to overcome the natural disadvantages of defense. Many conventions and methods of signaling have been adopted, whereby the defensive partners can transmit vital information to each other. It is highly important to be familiar with such conventions.

As an illustration of the defensive process at work, we have this hand where West led the seven of diamonds, the highest card of a worthless triple-ton in the suit his partner had bid. East won the jack and continued with the ace. West playing the five.

The five is correct, rather than the four, also in line with standard convention. The play of the four would deny possession of the five.

On the two diamond leads South dropped the nine and ten, deliberately concealing the deuce and hoping to persuade East that West had it.

East now shifted to the king of clubs, on which West played the seven to encourage a club continuation. West was afraid East might have had a five-card diamond suit, in which case declarer would be out of diamonds.

Another club lead would have proved fatal, but East led the king of diamonds and defeated the contract. He knew West could not have started with the 7-5-4-2, which would have called for a fourth best lead of the deuce. Declarer was therefore marked to have the four or the deuce, or both.

Conventions, when properly used, can be mighty helpful.
