# Albany Lions Plan Several Projects

SUMMERSIDE — Albany Lions club, organized only a few months ago, has already moved to provide its community and area with fire-fighting facilities, has purchased a building for conversion to club rooms and fire hall, bought about two acres of land for a community playground, turning a section of its property into an outdoor rink, and has taken over sponsorship of the Borden school patrol.

This active group of Albany Lions officially chartered last Oct. 16 when 16 chartered members of the club were inducted. At least six more are in the process of being added to the membership.

The president of the Albany club is W. F. McCormac, and other members of the executive are: Donald Cameron, first vice-president; Alastair MacLeod, second vice-president; George Green, hall wiper; Louis McCourt, lion tamer; C. H. MacDonald, secretary-treasurer; Layton Green and Flannoy Noonan, membership chairman. Other charter members of the club include Alex Dawson, Dan Kough, Earl Boulier, Kenneth Flavel, Lester MacLeod, Lawson Jenkins, William MacLennan.

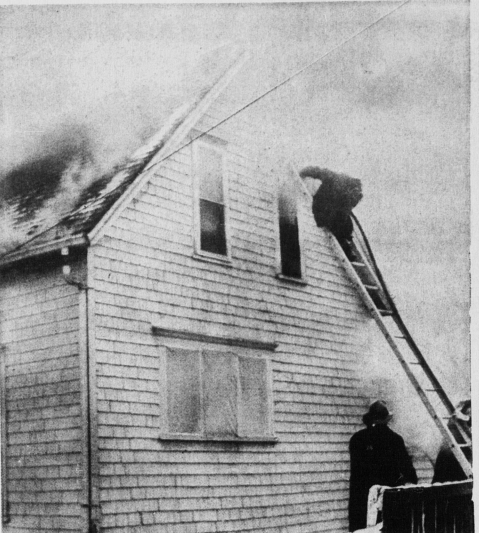
No meeting in a residence in Albany, owned by Alastair MacLeod, the club has purchased the former Albany church shed which is being moved to the two-acre field the club purchased in the village just south of the CNR station. When renovations are completed one section of the building will serve as a headquarters for the Lions Club meetings and activities, and the remainder will be used to house a fire engine that the club intends to help sponsor in providing fire protection for the village and surrounding communities.

The remaining part of the Borden school patrol, a project originally inaugurated by the Borden Lions Club, has also provided financial assistance to a fund aiding a family from Charlottetown who lost their residence and household effects in a recent fire.

One of the club's fund raising projects took the form of the sale of chocolates prior to the Christmas season and the netted the club about \$80.

Next Tuesday, Jan. 22, District Governor Colin MacKay of New Brunswick, N.B., will be visiting the club at a supper meeting in the village school.

Attendance at meetings has been an average of 90 per cent since the club was organized last month, giving the Albany Lions Club top average attendance in this district.

# 4 Families Homeless At S'side After Blaze

The blaze broke out shortly before 2:30 p.m. and had gained considerable headway when firemen arrived, with dense smoke hampering their efforts.

# HEREFORD BREEDERS TOLD P.E.I. Topped Maritimes In Best Grades Of Beef

By Neil Matheson — Provincial and Farm Editor — An enthusiastic group of beef breeders turned out to record attendance at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Heretford Breeders Association Saturday night as 84 people sat in a cosy dinner served by the North River Junior Farmers in their renovated hall. Guest speaker was S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, C. S. Scranton, Maritime pointing chairman, and a department of agriculture, showed slides taken last summer on a trip to Great Canada and the United States. Edwin MacRae, Winslow, who was elected president, presided.

This province produced more than a grade cattle in the first 11 months of the year than the other two Maritime provinces did together. Mr. Wright told the meeting. He was referring to the grades of choice, good and medium as listed in Canada department of agriculture market reports.

He said that the percentage of Grade A, B and C beef marked through registered pure-bred plants was two and one-half percent higher in November 1962 than they had been at the same time in 1961.

Mr. Stewart urged breeders to hold their cattle for the four to five months that are often needed to get them into the top grades. The housewife is constantly demanding a better quality product, and the producer must give it to her, he said.

Added to that is the fact that the big price spread is between the Brown or Standard brand carcasses and the premium which is a commercial grade, he explained.

It was stated at a meeting of the directors of the P.E.I. Tourist Association held at the Charlottetown Saturday.

Charles Linkletter, Summerside, association president, suggested that the directors should assume the burden of acquainting businessmen of the province with the desirability of joining the association and this action was agreed upon by the 12 directors present.

It was particularly noted that the areas of West Prince and Kings County are the most under-represented and in view of the expanding industry and a noticeable tourist trade to those areas it was suggested more business and tourist operators in these districts should have a voice in association matters.

The president noted from the financial report that the annual government grant to the association had not yet been received.
