**100 Head Dairy Cattle Shipped To Maine**

Over 100 head of high grade dairy cattle have been shipped out of the Province this summer to a Maine man, it was learned yesterday from Dr. R. S. MacDonald, D. V. M., with the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

The last shipment, a trailer load containing 22 head, left here last Thursday. All the cattle were purchased by Mr. John F. Weston, Fryeburg, Maine.

Animals of all dairy breeds including both grades and purebreds were bought. The greater number of the cattle were purebreds.

One of the main reasons why Mr. Weston has continued to purchase his cattle here is that the province is a disease free area, stated Dr. MacDonald. Each animal was blood tested by Dr. MacDonald before it left the province.

FRANK MACINNIS
