### Woman Is Deeply Hurt By Protege's Behaviour

Dear Mary Haworth: Several years ago a young man, then in his early 30s, came to this country in dedication to religious work. At first he seemed kind, humble and admirable in every way. I, for one, was so impressed that my admiration turned into deeper feeling, which he encouraged for a while. When he saw I was serious, he said he had misled me, that he didn't love me. This was a great shock, of course, but eventually a great disappointment, that he could be so frivolous. To be honest, I didn't believe him at first. I thought that he cared but was putting me off, so that he could devote himself to God. But then his resolve began to show clearly. He rejoiced in the society of teenage girls. This puzzled me, in a man of his years and experience. Many families remarked how he loved their young daughters. He had eyes for them all, from 13 to 17 years of age. He seemed indeed to feel unhappy and unfit, except in their company. Finally he gave up his religious work, found other employment and announced his intention to marry a girl, 17, then still in high school. They did in fact marry before she finished school. If he truly loved this one girl, how could he be attentive to so many others? And how could a man of his age and background even notice a high school student? At first his deception and insincerity were almost more than I could bear. But it wasn't long before I found someone for whom I cared deeply, and it is mutual. How do you explain this man's actions? And was I naive, old-fashioned or foolish? Many of us would appreciate your comments. L.S. Dear L.S.: I would suppose that your friend (let's him M.X.) was cannily committed to a struggle for survival on the best terms available to him at the time when he came to America some years ago, purportedly to dedicate himself to religious work. I would guess, also, that he came from one of the so-called backward countries, or, at any rate, from a parochial background, that had kept him in a shut-in, figuratively, from the larger world and its various patterns-of-living to choose from. Thus, when your path crossed his, soon after his arrival here, he probably was still a compliant sort of fellow, eager to please whoever might help him, grateful for every kindness shown him; also, a person temporarily shorn of self-confidence, and a stranger to the customs, manners, tastes and values of the new society surrounding him. Then, gradually, he began to get his bearings as an immigrant American, in terms of realizing that here he was free to experiment in finding himself, free to develop along lines of his natural preference, with respect to friendship, sex interests, life work and so on. From the vantage point of this new view of life's possibilities, he throws the switch on several fronts of activity. I gather, he turned from women your age to girl friends much younger. He gave up religious work in favor of other employment more to his liking. He married a teenage bride, in relation to whom he feels comfortably sure of his manhood, no doubt. In short, your friend Mr. X. has been much engrossed, in time you've known him, with catching up on his growth as a person. He hasn't encapsulated himself in one fixed groove of being-and-doing. Instead, he is reaching, sampling, reacting, changing; and, above all, identifying with high-hearted youth, rather than with Pecksniffish older-age attitudes of mind. All in all, your assuming that Mr. X. was in a mistake that he had a pious duty to conform to your notion of the person he should be, in order to enhance your self-esteem. ### Blueberries Cultivated For Epic Torte Delight

Out for a spring stroll on a day, the Chef and I walked to Rumpelmayer's Restaurant on N. Y.'s 59th St. "Let's stop for a cup of coffee and a piece of pie," said the Chef. The coffee was excellent; the pie, a cultivated Blueberry Torte, proved both different and delicious. Back in the test-kitchen, we worked out the recipe for such a pie that will delight Father on his day. Measurements level: recipes for 6

### CULTIVATED BLUEBERRY TORTE ST. MORITZ

(In 2 parts, the pie pastry and the pie filling) Pie Pastry: 1 pkg pie pastry mix, 1 tsp. fine-grated orange rind, 1/2 c. fine-chopped nuts, any kind. Pie Filling: 4 c. fresh cultivated blueberries, rinsed-and-drained, 1 c. sugar, 1/4 c. cornstarch, 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg, 2 tsp. butter, 3 tsp. confectioners' sugar. Prepare pastry following pkg. directions; add orange rind and nuts before adding liquid called for in directions. Roll out half the pastry and with it line 9" pie-plate. Moisten edge of pastry with a little cold water. To prepare the filling, mix blueberries with sugar, cornstarch and nutmeg. Turn into pastry-lined pan. Dot top with butter. Roll out remaining pastry and cover top of pie; crimp edges together. Cut 3 slits in top of pie pastry for steam-escape. Bake 1 hr. in mod. oven (375 degrees F.). Remove from oven; cool. Then stir over the confectioners' sugar.

### SALMON MOLD WITH GREEN PEAS

1/2 c. soft white bread crumbs, 1 c. heated milk, 1 lb. can salmon, 2 eggs, 1 tsp. minced parsley, 1/2 tsp. lemon juice, 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt, 1/2 tsp. onion powder, 1 (1 lb.) can small green peas, drained and heated, Parsley springs for garnish. Stir crumbs into milk; set aside. Open can of salmon; drain and reserve oil. Remove skin and bones and flake salmon fine. Separate eggs; beat whites stiff, yolks until creamy. Into salmon, stir in crumbs, parsley, lemon juice.

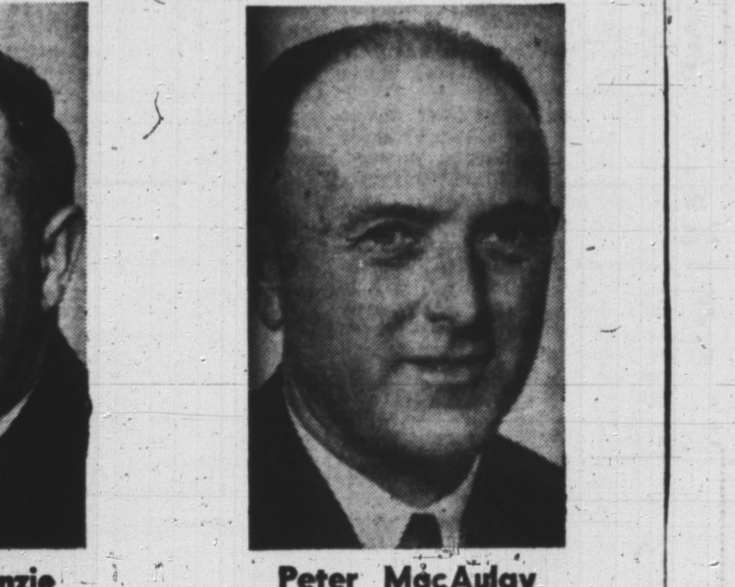
