THE Brig. "Gaven," McLure, master, owned by McLure, Bros., Murray River, from Liverpool for Murray Harbor, arrived at Hawkesbury, Nov. 14th, and arrived at Georgetown to-day.

THE Railway has this year moved a larger quantity of oats than in any previous year. Of potatoes the quantity has not been so large as in former years—but fully up to expectation.

He was presented yesterday with an elegant gold watch worth \$200, by the employes of the establishment."

TALLORES VS. DOMESTIC.—On Wednesday a domestic who resides on Kent street made the following complaint at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court: "That one Annie W— in company with another girl assaulted her with a stick and struck her several times across the arms and back and beat her seriously. The said domestic, is afraid to go outside the door where she resides for fear of the said Annie W—." The matter came up for trial before the Magistrate to-day. Miss Annie produced three witnesses; succeeded in proving an alibi, and the case was therefore dismissed.

WE are creditably informed that over sixty applications have been made for the office in the Customs Department of this city left vacant by the death of Mr. W. H. Wilson. It is not yet known whether or not an appointment will be made, as it is the intention of the Government to work the Department with fewer officials. The mission of Mr. Wolfe to this city is to enquire into the matter just mentioned, and if he finds that the business of the Department can be transacted with the present number of officials, no further appointments will be made.

A VERY PAINFUL CASE OF BEREAVEMENT AT LOT 48.—Mr. D. M. McLeod removed from Charlottetown to California early last summer. Mrs. McLeod, with her two children, had intended to proceed thither this fall. They would have left the Island the first part of this month; but just as all was ready diphtheria of a very malignant type settled upon the eldest of the children; and, after several days of severe suffering, little Cecil H. died Oct. 31, aged two years and five months. A few days after the younger, Laura M., took the same disease, and died Nov. 12, aged one year and three months.
