The Secretary announces that the Tenth  
Annual Convention of Sunday School  
Workers in the Maritime Provinces will be  
held in Moncton, N. B., on Saturday,  
October 16th, and following days.

The Committee recommend the following  
programme:—

FIRST SESSION.—Organization Meeting.—  
Saturday, 4 p. m.; Devotional Exercises;  
Nominating Committee; Election of Offi-  
cers and Committees; retiring President's  
address; Singing, prayer; Reports from  
Schools.

SECOND SESSION.—Welcome Meeting.—  
Address of Welcome; Address of President  
elect; Appropriate Addresses.

THIRD SESSION.—Relation of Sunday  
School work to the future of our country.

FOURTH SESSION.—The importance of reg-  
ular and punctual attendance of Teachers  
and Scholars, and how it may be secured.

FIFTH SESSION.—Reports of Delegates to  
the London Centenary Celebration.

SIXTH SESSION.—Primary Classes.

SEVENTH SESSION.—Reviews with prac-  
tical illustration.

EIGHTH SESSION.—Some of the respon-  
sibilities of S. S. Teachers.

The above programme to be subject to  
modification by Convention.

After opening of each subject briefly, an  
opportunity will be given for short ad-  
dresses by delegates.

The discussions of subjects will be opened  
by gentlemen appointed for that purpose,  
and sustained by members of the Con-  
vention.

In addition to Pastors and Superintend-  
ents (who are *ex officio* members), the Con-  
vention consists of one delegate from each  
Sunday School throughout the Maritime  
Provinces.

Delegates wishing to travel by Intercol-  
onial and P. E. I. Railways, or by Steamers  
of the P. E. I. Steam Navigation Com-  
pany, paying one first-class fare to the Con-  
vention, will be entitled to return free of  
charge; by the Windsor & Annapolis,  
Western Counties and Halifax and Cape  
Breton Railways, return for one-third of  
one-fare.

cash, at auction on the 23rd inst. Twelve  
years ago he passed through Ottawa en

### MISCELLANEOUS.

New silver five and ten cent pieces, bear-  
ing the date of 1880, have been recently  
put into circulation.

The Montreal Gazette says "A decline of  
3c per lb has taken place in refined sugar.  
Granulated is now quoted in that city at 10½  
@10½c, and cut loaf at 10½c @ 10½c.

The Allan Line Steamship *Buenos Ayres*  
left Montreal last week, with 582 head of  
cattle, for the British market, the largest  
single shipment of live stock ever made from  
the port.

According to the Whitehall Review the  
Princess Louise, although better for a sea  
voyage to England, is in very delicate  
health. She suffers from utter sleepless-  
ness.

"The Cable of 1880," as the last new  
cable is called, which has just been laid in  
eleven days, was at work in transmitting  
messages half an hour after the submer-  
gence was effected.

"Don't sit so far away from me, Harry  
dear," she said to her lover, while they  
were steaming up the bay with the excursion,  
"don't sit so far away and turn your  
back to me in that way; people will think  
we are married."

"If you are a quiet, honest citizen of  
Hamilton, how did these skeleton keys and  
brass knuckles happen to be in your coat  
pocket?" "I guess, judge, me and the  
policeman must have changed coats in the  
scuffle. We were very much excited."

Mr. Gladstone was nowhere more enthu-  
siastically received during his recent trip  
than in Ireland. A great many people  
went down to Kingstown to see the Premier  
embark, and one Roman Catholic Priest  
from the country was so enthusiastic that  
he caught Mr. Gladstone's hand and kissed  
it amid great applause.

Dickey and Buckley of St. John N. B.,  
are to ship 32 head of cattle and 150 sheep  
in the Dominion Line steamer sailing for  
England from Quebec on the 16th of Octo-  
ber. These animals were purchased in the  
Maritime Provinces. John Avard also of  
St. John, has about 150 head of cattle  
ready for shipment in about ten days.

The large and increasing amounts paid  
by the newspapers of America for tele-  
graphic despatches are in part shown  
by the receipts of one company, the  
Western Union, which received from the  
press during the year ending the 30th  
June, about \$1,200,000. The increase in  
business from this source the past six  
months is \$80,000.

Within a very near approach to truth,  
the human family inhabiting the earth has  
been estimated at 1,000,000,000; the annual  
death is 18,000,000. Now, the weight of  
the animal matter of this immense body  
cast into the grave is no less than 634,000  
tons, and its decomposition produces 9,000,-  
000 cubic feet of matter. The vegetable  
productions of the earth clear away from  
the earth the gases thus generated, and  
decomposing and assimilating them for  
their own increase. This circle of change  
has been going on ever since man has  
been an occupier of the earth. He feeds  
on the lower animals and on the seeds of  
plant, which in due time become a part of  
himself. The lower animals feed upon the  
herbs and grasses, which in their turn be-  
come the animal; then by its death pass  
into the atmosphere, and are ready once  
more to be assimilated by plants, the earth  
or bone substance alone remaining where it  
has been deposited.

The crisis in the Sandwich Islands was a  
strange one. A new ministry has been  
formed, the King having taken into his  
confidence one Celsus Caesar Moreno and  
made him Minister of Foreign Affairs.  
This man is believed to have been a black  
leg, and certainly lived by his wits. The  
old Ministers were turned out. Of the  
new ones two were natives, one was an  
American and the fourth was this Italian  
adventurer, but the others were his crea-  
tures. The people held a public meeting at  
Honolulu and denounced the King for  
having "arbitrarily dissolved the Minis-  
try," and declared that "Moreno was a  
foreign adventurer identified with interests  
hostile to the prosperity of the Hawaiian  
Kingdom." They charged the King with  
acting contrary to constitutional principles.  
There was fear that the palace would be  
attacked, and there was strong talk of  
de-throning His Majesty and placing Queen  
Emma on the throne. In the meantime  
the King had the palace grounds guarded  
by cannon. The foreign ministers resident  
would not recognize Moreno; and finally  
the King, after holding out as long as he  
could, gave in and asked Moreno to hand  
over his portfolio. At last accounts the  
people were talking of tar and feathers,  
and had ordered Moreno to leave the  
Islands in the first place. It was a verita-  
ble tempest in a teapot, but it might have  
been serious.
