Saints Fritter Away 3-Goal Lead To Lose To Saint John Beavers 6-5

HALIFAX, Feb. 7—(CP)—Halifax Saints frittered away a three-goal lead tonight and Saint John Beavers scored a 6-5 victory in a penalty-ridden Maritime Major Hockey League game before a paid crowd of 4,510.

After trailing all the way, the league leaders skated the Saints dizzy in the final period and snatched a well-earned victory on Dusty Blair's blazing wing shot just 17 seconds before the end of the game.

The defeat was a body blow to Saints, who had lost only one game on home ice to Glace Bay since late in December. The way the Saints played in the early stages of the game, there appeared little likelihood of the brisk Beavers scoring an upset. But when the Saints faded, there were no half-way measures. They faded completely.

The penalty box was seldom empty. Fourteen penalties were called, chief culprit was Coach Peanuts O'Flaherty of Beavers, who was thrown out of the game

after getting a misconduct and then a match misconduct penalty. Buchanan and Mesich of the Beavers also had misconduct penalties. For deliberately attempting to injure each other with their sticks, Kenny Watson of the Beavers and Fred Weaver of the Saints were tagged with match misconduct penalties and escorted to their dressing rooms by police.

Ironically, the final penalty of the night—a minor to Unger of the Saints for what looked to be an accidental trip—was the costly one. While Unger was off, Beavers potted the winning goal.

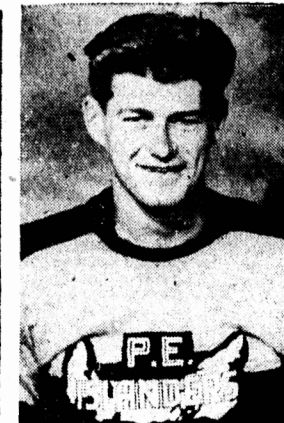

GLACE BAY, N.S., Feb. 7—(CP)—Charlottetown Islanders downed Glace Bay Miners 3-1 tonight in a game which could have shifted the standings of the Maritime Major Hockey League division radically.

But Islanders' win, coupled with Halifax St. Mary's defeat by Saint John Beavers, left the standings as they were with Miners one point behind third-place Halifax. A Halifax win and Charlottetown loss would have put Saints in second place. Islanders are three points ahead of Halifax.

The first period told the story tonight as Islanders, winners of the old four-team Big Four title last season, shot two tallies after two-thirds of the period had passed.
