Receipts Wednesday were 73 cattle, 85 calves, 54 hogs and 62 sheep and lambs. Tuesday's receipts at both markets were: 476 cattle, 489 calves, 315 hogs and 102 sheep and lambs.

Medium heifers sold at 19.17. Medium cows were 16, common 14.13 and canners and cutters 10.59-14.

Good bulls were 19-21.50 and common and medium 16-19.

Good vealers sold at 27.30, medium 21-26 and common 18-20.

Grade A hogs were 32-32.50 with most 32 plus 80 cents each. Sows were 21 with most at 21 plus 80 cents each.

Good lambs were 20 - 21 and sheep 14.
