# Says P.E.I. Is Considered 2nd Oil Exploratory Area

TORONTO (CP)—Imperial Oil Limited announced here Monday that its exploratory well, Imperial Wellington No. 1, near Summerside, P.E.I., failed to bring in oil and is being abandoned.

Imperial Porthill No. 1, will be "spudded-in" at the end of the week. It will be located on the farm by Bayfield Ramsay, one mile south of Porthill Station.

Work on Wellington No. 1 started in March when a rig and a 25-man crew were taken to Summerside from Alberta. It was sunk 9,714 feet but did not reach bedrock. The cost is estimated at \$200,000.

# All Aircraft Movements To Be Reported, Day And Night

Ground observer Corps will report any aircraft at all times and at any hour of the day or night, according to the new system being initiated for this purpose.

At the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, Sunday, about fifty Regional Supervisors and Chief Observers throughout the province received initial instruction on "Canscan", the new system for reporting aircraft.

Another change has been made in the new system by coding the observation posts which are off the normal air routes and which will report all aircraft that are seen or heard.

Group No. 2 includes the posts which are located along the regular air routes and these will report low flying aircraft and emergency matters.

Group 3 are those observation posts which are within twenty

miles of an aircraft, and these will not report aircraft which are landing or taking off from their nearby airport.

The province of Prince Edward Island has been divided into five regions, each with a regional supervisor. Each region has about 12 observation posts with a chief observer in charge who has about 20 official observers working with him.

The conference Sunday at R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, was also attended by R.C.A.F. staffs from the Ground Observer Control Centers at Truro and Moncton.

All of those who attended were welcomed by the commanding officer of the Summerside Station, Group Captain W.H. Swetman, at a noon luncheon, and later took time out for a tour of the station.
