TORONTO (CP) - Gunbar Mining climbed 11 cents to \$2.02 in active dealings on the Toronto Stock Exchange Tuesday...

Gunbar traded as high as \$2.08 and as low as \$1.75. After the close of trading, the company said its construction division, McNamara Corp., had lost \$70,000 in the seven months ended July 31, but that it hoped "present difficulties will be resolved."

It added that the 20-cent dividend payable Oct. 1 will be made.

The statement was issued on the urging of the Toronto Stock Exchange after Gunbar stock advanced \$1.25 to less than \$2 on 10 days ago.

Meanwhile, another company with financial problems of a different kind took a small loss. United New Fortune fell 3 1/2 to 16 1/2 cents. In a statement to the TSE, the company said: "substantial funds appear to have been improperly used in the treasury, and efforts are being made to trace down the funds and secure their return."

Speculative mining issues were almost all lower. United Bedford dipped 10 cents to \$1.44 and traded in a \$1.55-\$1.28 range. Speculators are awaiting results of the company's second drill hole on its molychendite prospect in the Endako area of British Columbia.

Raglan fell 8 to \$1.95. Obaska 3 to 35 cents, Northclark 4 to 30 cents and Probe 4 to 45 cents. Industrials were lower with

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Captain's Island Is Haven To Over 20,000 B.C. Boys

By JACK BRAUCKMANN VICTORIA (CP) - Weather has created a gentle face and 90 long years have bowed a ramrod back.

One leg won't bend and its mate isn't as steady as it used to be. But at the wheel of a launch breaking through choppy seas the back straightens and the legs can still do their work for Captain Beaumont.

Ernest Godfrey Beaumont of Victoria is a gentleman by breeding, a promoter of the Gulf Islands by vocation and a captain by popular acclaim.

Descended from royalty, he has been undisputed king of Discovery Island near Victoria for nearly half a century.

He is a philanthropist who has donated 400 acres of choice parkland to British Columbia and a sportsman who, despite his 90 years and game leg, sculls a racing shell around his and neighboring islands several times each week.

But he is best known in British Columbia for a role that has given him the most pleasure in his life—playing host over the years to some 20,000 boys from B.C. youth and church organizations who are ushered to his island in boatloads every summer.

He believes each and every boy is born good and only needs the right kind of young life to remain good.

"I think the boys found a part of that 'right kind of life' here on Discovery," he says.

HAPPY BOYHOODS The boys have been coming since Captain Beaumont and his wife purchased the island in 1918. He believed the blue waters of the Pacific, the sandy dunes, the hills and verdant meadows provided a perfect environment for youngsters.

He added a clubhouses, a bunkhouse, canoes and rowboats—all to help make happy boyhoods for city kids. More recently he has bought an army surplus jeep equipped with a siren.

"The boys get a big thrill roaring around the island with the siren blaring," he says.

Swimming, fishing and swimming played a large part in the outdoor life of the boys but Captain Beaumont has never had any serious accident with any of his charges.

"From time to time a lad fell overboard but no one minded the dunking because it was such a spectacle," he says with a twinkle in his eye.

The captain has had long experience teaching youngsters. In his early days in England he tutored and prepared the sons of British gentry for university or Sandhurst military college. His pupils included the cousin of Field Marshal Montgomery and the son of Gen. Sir Arthur Paget.

Captain Beaumont's own boyhood was marred by an accident which left him with a broken leg. In his 13th birthday, a football injury nearly cost him his leg. After a series of operations by Sir James Paget the leg was saved although it remains rigid to this day.

From Victoria, five miles away. Once a year, however, the captain sculls the distance "just to give the youngsters a shock."

GENTLE BACKGROUND His wife, the former Constance Ida Hay Currie, was a willing partner in the island adventure until her death in 1952.

"She loved this; though—life nobly although it was far from the life of her youth," he says.

Mrs. Beaumont had been raised in the gentle upper-class atmosphere of Edwardian England as the daughter of a partner in the distinguished banking firm of Currie, Glyn-Mills and Currie.

The Beaumonts had no children of their own. Instead they played step-parents to the thousands of boys who romped on the beaches and in the meadows of Discovery Island.

Having lived the life of a retired gentleman for these many years, the Captain's sole income is from early investments, including some annuities purchased about 35 years ago.

"That was a coup," he says. "My life expectancy when I bought those annuities was 16 years. I've been living free for almost 20 years."

His third boat, a small motor launch called Discovery Isle III, now provides transport to and from the island.
