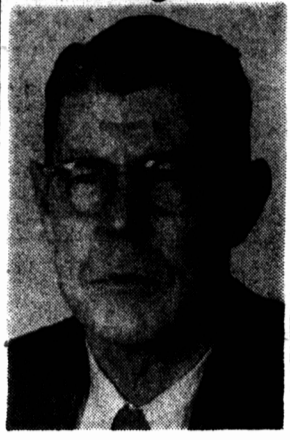

Mrs. Adams is the wife of a wheat farmer and Hereford breeder and lives thirty miles from the nearest shopping centre.

The President of the Canadian Women's Institute Federation has come up through the ranks. She has been interested in institute work ever since her marriage in 1937 when she helped organize a branch in her community.

At a later date she was the provincial president. She is a provincial president and has held the office of vice-president in the National organization. In 1950 she led the Saskatchewan delegation to a conference at Copenhagen, Denmark.
