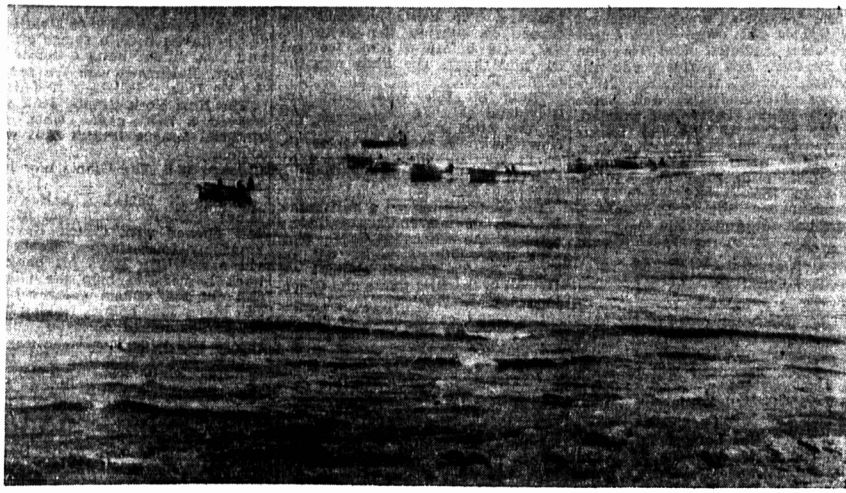
A delegation Friday completed a tour of Newfoundland's 15 government-financed industries and a brief today said it was "not endorsing the wisdom of establishing these industries."

The report, however, said "the board has no information regarding the marketing of the goods they produce, their competitive position in the matter of transportation costs, efficiency of output and financial obligations."

"But," the report said, "the board cannot share in full measure the optimism displayed on certain occasions by the government as to the ultimate success of these industries."
