



Large Barn At Milltown Cross Destroyed By Fire

A large barn on the farm of Peter MacDonald, Milltown Cross, about 1/2 mile from the Commercial Road, was completely destroyed by fire of unknown origin at an early hour yesterday morning. It was thought that the fire started about 12:30 a.m., but was not noticed for some time, and then too late to save it or any of the farm machinery which it contained. The barn was covered with a metal roof which confined the fire within the building, and it all collapsed shortly after the crowd gathered.

Says Cause Of Bad Polio Vaccine Now Corrected

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE KANSAS CITY (AP)—The main reasons for production of some bad polio vaccine last spring have been found and corrected, a special committee of polio experts announced Thursday.

Safe and potent vaccine now can be manufactured more easily in larger amounts, said Dr. Leonard Scheele, surgeon-general of the U.S. Public Health Service, in releasing the report.

While all vaccine released for the U.S. public since May 26 has been checked out as safe, the new changes mean production can roll ahead with few or no bad batches showing up during manufacture, he said.

It means it (any bad vaccine) won't happen again, said one expert interpreting the report. The report mentions two apparent reasons why some batches of vaccine could contain living virus: 1. Differences in manufacturers methods of filtering the starting liquid containing live virus, before the viruses are exposed to formaldehyde to kill them all.

Such differences could have permitted some viruses to stick together in bunches, so viruses inside the bunch were not exposed and killed.
