OTTAWA (CP) — United States players—most of them from Hamtramck, Mich.—won all five titles settled Thursday at the Canadian Junior tennis championships. Three other crowns scheduled for Thursday—junior women's and boys' and girls' doubles—were postponed because of an almost continuous drizzle, made even worse by chilly weather. Carrie Heldman, 13, and Ron Seifert, 12, of South Bend, Ind., nabbed two championships each as the tournament swung through its second last day at the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club. Seifert defeated Belkin 2-4, 6-2 to win the juvenile boys' singles crown. They won the juvenile boys' doubles together Wednesday. Virginia Hease, 15, and Pancho Castillo, 15, both of the Hamtramck team, won the other two championships. Virginia took the junior women's singles crown with 6-4, 6-4 win over Ann Barclay, 17, of Vancouver. Pancho defeated Warren Daane, 14, of Cleveland, 6-1, 6-1 to win the boys' singles title. 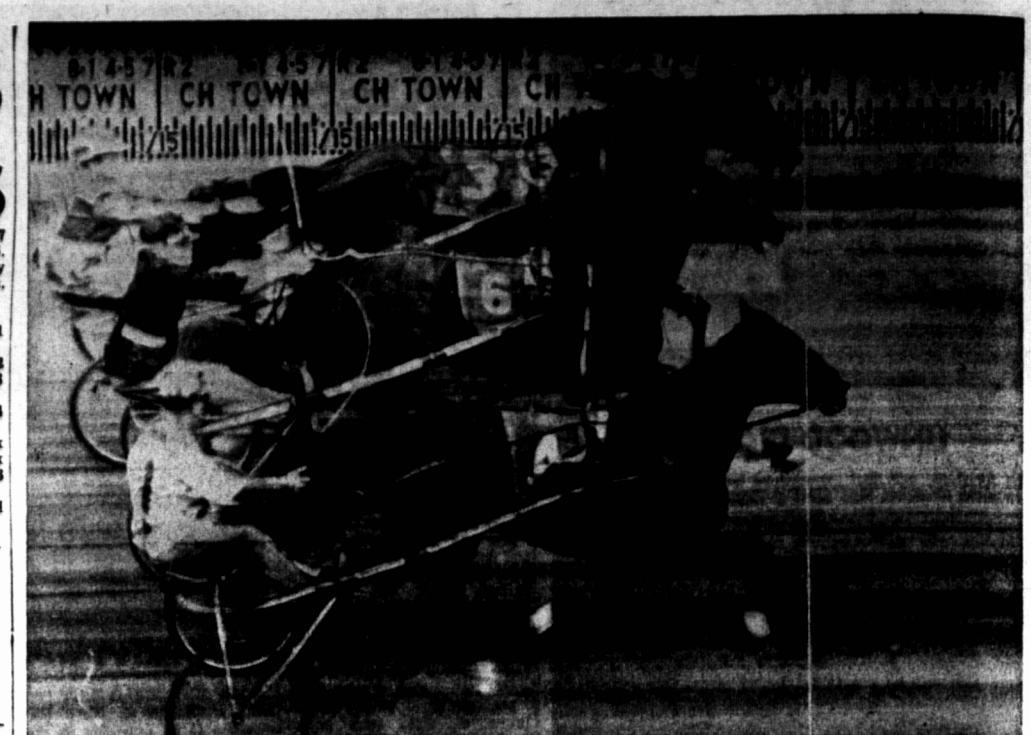

Indian Outlasts Brazilian In Toughest Tennis Semi-Final

MONTREAL (CP) — Ramanaiah Krishnan of India outlasted Brazil's Carlos Fernandez 6-2, 6-4, 5-7, 4-6, 6-4 Thursday in the longest and hardest-fought match of the quarter-finals of the Canadian tennis championships. The Madras economics student from Madras seemed to have the match all wrapped up in the third set when he was leading 54 with two sets already in his pocket, but Fernandez beat back the Indian's control game to deuce the set and go on to win. Krishnan matched his cool control against the 19-year-old Fernandez' legs and finally wore down his opponent in the final set. He placed the ball into corners and chopped it short over the net with almost casual perfection and kept Fernandez running from side to side. Krishnan, top-seeded foreigner in the tournament, now meets second-seeded Bob Howe of Australia in the semi-finals today. In the other semi-final bracket is Canada's Bob Bedard — the last surviving Canadian in the singles event — and Brazil's Armando Vieira.

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. New York Yankees retained a 5½-game lead in the American League pennant race Thursday, defeating Boston 6-3 although Red Soxer Ted Williams upped his batting average to .393. The second-place Chicago White Sox were split 5-4 at Cleveland with all the Indians' runs unearned. In the National League, second-place St. Louis Cardinals lost nine in a row for the first time since 1947 as the seventh-place Chicago Cubs won 4-1 for their second consecutive three-game sweep against the Redbirds.

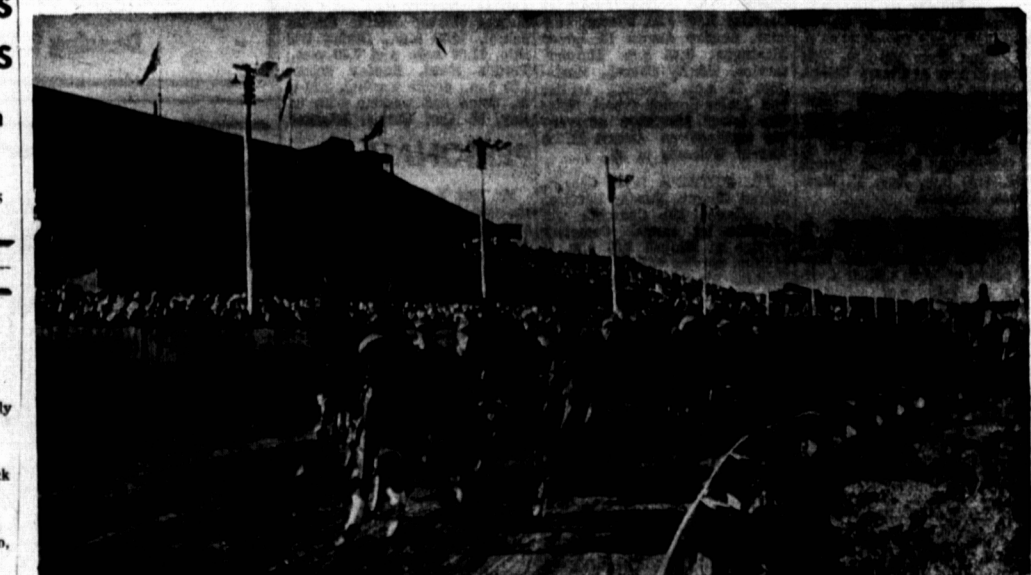
