THERE are said to be several cases of "Cyprius fever" in Halifax—brought there by the 101st Regiment from Cyprus.

TWENTY-TWO hundred Catholic ladies of the Rhine Provinces have forwarded a petition to the Emperor William against the suppression of Ursuline Convents.

THE Moncton Times says that among the passengers for Ottawa, on Monday night, were Mr. Hackett, M. P., and Hon. Senator Howland. It adds that Senator Howland was quite ill.

A CONFERENCE of delegates from the Chambers of Commerce in the different parts of the German Empire has expressed an opinion against the Customs programme of Bismarck.

MR. W. C. DESBRISAY calls attention to the fact that his name was, in our last issue, inserted in the Carnival Committee instead of that of W. C. Hobkirk, to whom the credit properly belongs.

MR. JAMES LATTON, of the firm of W. A. Weeks & Co., left here on Monday last for Halifax, where he will take passage by steamer for England to-day, to purchase a stock of spring goods for this firm.

FROM Ottawa it is reported that nearly all the Departmental reports of the past year have been printed and are now stowed away in the vaults, awaiting the proper moment for distribution.

It is reported at St. Petersburg that the Chinese have been defeated by Sarts, who captured the city of Kashgar and its environs, but the Chinese fortress near Kashgar was not taken.

In the Jail Courtroom yesterday, Peter Donnelly was examined before Thoph. DesBrisay, Esq., for stealing a horse and two geese from Mr. Peter Donnelly, Lot 30, and remanded to await trial at the next session of the Supreme Court for the offence.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Dominion Parliament. Preliminary Work—Returns of Election Petitions.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.
OTTAWA, Feb. 15.
After the delivery of the Governor General's speech yesterday, the House of Commons retired to their Chamber and the Speaker read the returns of the Judges in certain election petitions.
The election in Drummond and Arthabasca was declared void. The sitting member for Kamarouska is confirmed in his seat. In East Hastings a new election is ordered.
The Speaker also presented the Speech from the throne, and it was read by the Clerk.
Sir John McDonald moved that it be considered on Monday next.
The House then adjourned until Monday.
The Drawing Room last night was a grand affair. It will be continued to night.
LONDON, Feb. 14.
A Vienna despatch says that Russia persists in regarding the Russian occupation of Arabatabia as an affront to her military honor which must be settled between herself and Roumania.
Russia's attitude is almost sure to find support at Berlin.
A Russian brigade has been ordered up from Babahagh to support it; but, before it arrives, it may be hoped that the Powers will find some way to allay the asperity of the Act.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 14.
It is understood that the strikers have left it to their delegates to make the best possible terms with steamship owners. The masters will meet a delegation of ten men to-morrow, for final decision. Meantime the men are showing every sign of resuming work at the reduction.

BERLIN, Feb. 14.
The Lower House of the Prussian Diet to-day rejected a resolution moved by the Budget Committee expressing opposition to the purchase of leading railroads.

LONDON, Feb. 14.
There are some signs that a section of the strikers at Liverpool are wavering. At a meeting on Thursday, at which 10,000 were present, it was resolved as a compromise to accept a penny reduction on over time.
The masters refuse the terms, while the Star Steamship Company's laborers offer to submit to arbitration, if they, in the meantime, are allowed their old wages. The strike caused no delay in the equipment of the transports. The National Line Company obtained 200 laborers from Glasgow yesterday.
