## ENGAGEMENT AT WEPENER

### FIGHTING WAS CONTINUED THIS MORNING.

### Roberts Believed to be in for a Winter Campaign.

### Small Bodies of the Boers seen at Orange River— Boers Rejoining old Commandos—A Boer Trick Discovered—Rumors Regarding Boer Forces—Movements of the Canadians.

#### SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

##### A FIGHT GOING ON.

ALEWAL NORTH, April 10.—An engagement took place yesterday at Wepener.

The Boers guns did considerable execution at first, but the British guns soon got the range and made great havoc. Heavy fighting continued this morning. The result is unknown.

Three Boer commandos are attacking the town.

##### INTERESTING ITEMS.

LONDON, April 10.—The British people realize that Lord Roberts is in for a winter campaign, lasting several months.

Lord Kitchener has charge of the railway, while Lord Roberts waits for remounts and thick uniforms.

Of the 52 prisoners captured at Boshop, 3 are Dutch,—remainder are Europeans. Small bodies of the enemy have been seen at Orange River.

There is a commando of 600 at Rouxville and two commandoes are at Wepener and the third on the way. But so far there has been outpost fixing alone.

The Boers who had taken the non-combatants oath are rejoining their old commandos.

##### TRICK DISCOVERED.

LONDON, April 10.—The Dukes of Marlborough and Westminster and Lord Bentinck have gone to the front.

The Boers tried to lure the Mafeking garrison into a mine ambush of 250 pounds of dynamite; but the engineers discovered it and cut the wire communications.

What the chances are for an advance on Pretoria may be judged from the fact that only from six to ten thousand horses are on their way to the Cape, and from the further fact that the military tailoring departments, only within the last three weeks began making woolen khaki uniform.

It is said that it will take at least two months to provide 200,000 uniforms.

##### MOVEMENTS OF CANADIANS.

BLOEMFONTEIN, April 10.—The Canadians returned on Friday from a second demonstration eastward. They started on Wednesday with only an hour's notice, and marched to Reitfontein farm, twelve miles to the southeast. On Thursday the whole division advanced on a strong position, but found no trace of the enemy and accordingly returned next day. Pte. W. J. Vanderwate, Q. C. R., wounded at Paardeberg on the 18th of February, and E. N. Rae, of the 34 Battalion, who are sick are to go to Netley Hospital.

##### CORRESPONDENTS REPORT.

LONDON, April 10.—The Bloemfontein correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphing on Sunday says: "The air is thick with rumors of large forces of Boers to the southward, but there is no positive official information on the subject.

On the other hand, the railway is said to be well guarded.

LONDON, April 10.—The Bloemfontein correspondent of the Morning Post says

The movement of troops continues with bewildering frequency, brigades and divisions appearing and disappearing at brief intervals. No specific accounts of such movements are permitted.

Some remounts were fired at yesterday on the railway while they were on the way here from the south.

The enemy are reported to be in considerable numbers to the south east of the line.

The Boers are also apparently feeling their way frequently to the western line.

A party has been thrown forward and has re-occupied the laager at Paardeberg, probably in search of buried arms and ammunition.

##### DISASTER DISCOUNTED.

CAPE TOWN, April 10.—The disaster at Riddersberg is considerably discounted, as Boer Commando which captured our force cannot get away. Other British forces under General Gatacre, including cavalry, are in hot pursuit.

##### KENHARDT REANNEXED.

CARNARVON, Cape Colony, April 9.—Kenhardt was formally re-annexed to Cape Colony, April 1st, amid the cheers of the assembled troops.

Colonel Drury's column, including the West Australians and the Canadian Mounted Rifles and Artillery, left here yesterday for D'Ass.
