RUSSIA is to issue another loan.

AUSTRIA is negotiating for arrangements similar to the Anglo Turkish convention.

DR. TUPPER's residence at St. Andrew's was partially destroyed by fire on the 16th.

THERE were fifty cases of sunstroke on the 10th in St. Louis, Mo., and twenty deaths from that cause.

THE July session of the Grand Division, Sons of Temperance, convenes at Graham Road on Thursday morning next.

THE steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived from Halifax this morning with merchandise and four passengers.

DR. CARVER, the famous marksman, lately performed the wonderful feat of breaking 5,500 glass balls with a rifle in, 8h. 94m. at Brooklyn.

THE St. John Telegraph regrets very much that Tully and King are out as candidates in Opposition to the Government which it now supports.

THE steamer "Carroll" sailed for Boston this evening at 5 o'clock, with a cargo of 540 boxes of eggs. Mr. and Mrs. Walker and William Gordon were passengers.

THE signal for the boat from Pictou last evening was hoisted about fifteen minutes before the steamer arrived at the wharf and was left up for about half an hour after her arrival. Truly, we have competent officials!

THE political event of last week in the United States is the removal by President Hayes of Collector Arthur and Naval Officer Cornell from the New York Custom House and the appointment of Gen. Merritt to the former and Mr. Burt to the latter office.

CHARLES MARVIN, copying clerk in the treaty department of the Foreign Office, charged with stealing a copy of the Salisbury-Schouvaloff agreement, and furnishing it to the Globe, has been discharged by Vaughan, the magistrate, at Bow street, the declaring that the evidence for the prosecution afforded no ground for the committal of the accused.

LOCAL POLITICS OF NEW BRUNSWICK.—The election consequent upon Hon. Mr. Landry accepting the Board of Works portfolio, will take place on the 29th inst., and declaration on August 1st. It is likely that there will be no opposition, though his appointment, as well as that of Hon. Mr. Hanington, creates great excitement.

St. Johns, P. Q. News:—"When the American horse-buyer offers one of our farmers \$80 for a horse on the streets of St. Johns, he does not hesitate to say that if he had him in St. Albans he would give the seller \$100 for him; but inasmuch as he will have to pay the 20 per cent. duty \$80, or a fraction over that, is all that he can afford to pay."

SITTING BULL.—A Bismarck special says a report was current there that the hostile Nez Perce Indians in Canadian territory with Sitting Bull are quietly moving across the mountains back to their old home. Major Craine, of the Canadian police, left Fort Walsh to try and obtain the peaceable removal of the Nez Perces to the United States.

MR. JOHN H. MURRAY'S Grand Circus arrived from Pictou this forenoon, on board the steamer Southport. Immediately after the arrival, the canvass was removed to the exhibition grounds on the corner of Fitzroy and Edward Streets, and the booths quickly erected. At four o'clock this evening the Brass Band passed through the different streets in their "Great Golden Car," playing popular music. The performance will commence this evening at 8 o'clock, sharp.

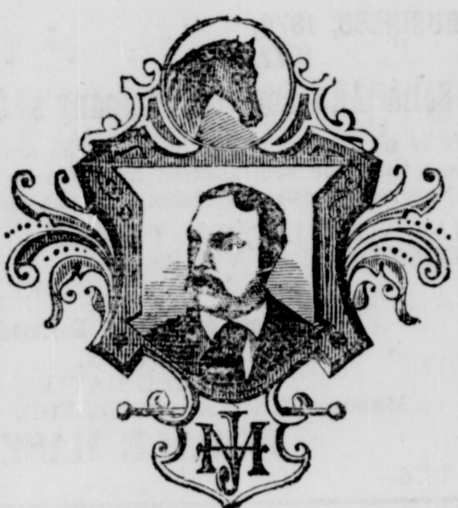

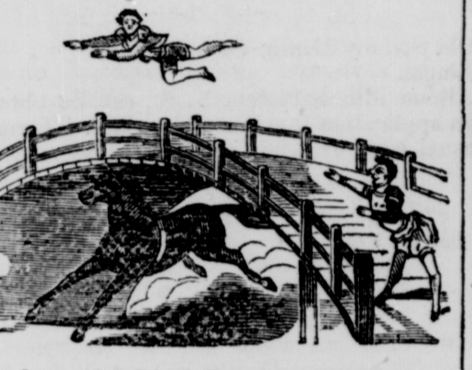
