

# Roy Campanella's Single Gives Dodgers 6-3 Win

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Roy Campanella's two-out single scored three eighth-inning runs that broke up a game and brought the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers a 6-3 victory over Milwaukee Monday, reducing the Braves' National League lead to two games over again.

It was the only league game scheduled for the day. In the American, Cleveland was a Washington for a night encounter.

A leadoff double by Junior Gilliam, a sacrifice and an intentional walk to Duke Snider, who had walked his 35th home run earlier as the Dodgers started whittling away at a 3-4 Milwaukee lead, got the Brooks rolling in the eighth against starter Gene Conley. But Carl Furillo next hit a bouncer back to the mound which Conley turned into a run-down that

caught Gilliam between third and home for the second out.

Then Jackie Robinson was given an intentional walk to load the bases and Campy came up to knock his break-up single to left center.

Joe Adcock's 33rd home run in the second and Bobby Thomson's 18th, with a man on in the fourth, gave the Braves their early lead against 30-game-winner Don Newcombe. Snider smacked his homer with one on in the sixth and the Dodgers then tied it in the seventh as Robinson doubled and Sandy Amoros singled.

Don Essent won his first of the year, allowing just one hit over the last four innings in relief of Newcombe. Conley now is 7-8.

The victory gave the Dodgers a split in their final two-game series in County Stadium this season.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chico Carrasquel slammed two home runs and a double and Rocky Colavito smashed his 17th homer Monday night as Cleveland defeated Washington 5-2. Bob Lemon won his 17th game of the season and the 19th of his major league career as the second-place Indians trounced New York Yankees' lead to seven games.

in the fifth, while Colavito crashed his homer off Bucky Stewart with none aboard in the sixth inning.

The Indians boosted their lead to 5-0 in the seventh when Carrasquel doubled, took third on Lemon's single and scored when Al Smith forced Lemon.

# Schoendienst Slugs Way Into N.L. Batting Race

NEW YORK (AP) — Al (Red) Schoendienst, a tower of strength for New York Giants since his acquisition from St. Louis June 14, has stroked his way into the thick of the National League batting race.

The 33-year-old switch-hitting second baseman hopes to win the title that narrowly eluded him in 1953 when he finished second to Brooklyn's Carl Furillo. Red had a .342 average to .344 for the

Dodgers' outfielder. While Wally Moon of the Cards and Milwaukee's Hank Aaron changed positions at the individual standings last week, Schoendienst moved into third place. The redhead showed the largest increase among the leaders, climbing nine points to .329 with 14 hits in 35 times at bat. He was hit safely in 14 of his last 15 games.

Moon, the Cards' rightfielder, took over the lead by gaining

seven points to .338. He had 13 hits in 28 trips. Aaron, the pacesetter, continued to be dominated by Mickey Mantle of the Yankees. Although he hit only two homers to give him 44 for the campaign, Mantle gained ground in the batting derby.

Mickey boosted his average two points to .364 while Boston's Ted Williams, in the No. 2 spot, slumped three points to .324.

Mantle also drove in five runs to lift his league-leading total to 112 while Al Kaline of the Tigers, last season's batting leader, also picked up five RBIs for an aggregate of 39, the records include Sunday's games.

Ted Kluzewski, big muscleman of Cincinnati Redlegs, moved up one notch to fourth place in batting with a .314 mark, and by driving home nine runs, took over the National League runs batted in lead with 83. Stan Musial of the Cards is second with 81.

Duke Snider of Brooklyn still is the senior circuit's top man in home runs with 34. He had only one last week while Kluzewski walloped a pair, giving him 33.

Mickey was not an immediate success, but he showed potentialities and now, with Williams and Musial near the end of their spectacular careers, the Yankee switcher has come into his own and is one of the greatest gate attractions the game has known.

Babe Ruth played his last game in 1935, and it is significant that DiMaggio came up the following year to fill at least partially the void created by the departure of the Bambino.

Also Lou Gehrig still was going strong when DiMaggio came along so the career of the Yankee Clipper and Gehrig dovetailed for a couple of years until a tragic ailment wrote an untimely end to the playing days of the Yankee iron man.

The careers of Ruth and Ty Cobb also dovetailed. The exciting Cobb long had been a star when the Babe appeared on the scene, and he still was at his peak when Ruth splashed into the spotlight with 29 home runs in 1919 after a brief but spectacular career as a pitcher.

### MORE CANDIDATES

Cobb's career dovetailed with that of another supe-star, Honus Wagner, not to mention Tyis Speaker, and on his batting feats alone you'd have to include Rogers Hornsby, who came up in the heyday of Cobb and Speaker and carried on until the start of the DiMaggio era.
