Olva made a belated cut of Los Angeles manager Bill Rigney by flailing Angels pitchers for six hits in nine times at bat in a two-game series earlier this month. He's a heck of a hitter. Rigney said after Olva collected four hits, including a grand-slam home run and a solo homer and drove 10 runs in a 5-1 win by the Twins. "I haven't noticed too much he can't hit. It looks like we'll have to throw him spinners and hope to down him."

Olva, 6-foot-1 and 175 pounds, hits with remarkable power, like Aaron. Minnesota's great outfielder is one of those spray hitters who hits the ball where it's pitched.

Going into the weekend series against Baltimore, Olva is leading the league in hitting with a .357 mark. He tops the loop in hits, 35, and is tied for the triple lead with 4. Last season he hit a remarkable 429 in only seven games with the Twins. For 146 games he hit .284 (44-157, World).

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETINGS

Who may vote at these meetings?

1. Every person who, whose husband or wife, is a ratepayer in the district, and who, and whose husband or wife, has paid in full all district school rates and taxes, including dog tax if assessed, imposed upon him, may vote at any school meeting on any question.

2. Every woman residing in the district and being the mother, step-mother or adoptive mother of a child of school age residing with her and in actual attendance at the school of the district, shall be a qualified voter at all school meetings and shall be eligible for election as a trustee unless at all school meetings she is in arrears of school taxes or dog tax assessed against her.

The Order of Business is detailed in Section 29 of the School Act. Letters from the Department of Education and the Superintendent of Schools have been sent to School Board Secretaries and should be read at these meetings.

Districts that are not included in a regular high school unit must apply to the Department of Education if they wish to join a unit. Requests will be passed to the Boundaries Commission who will determine the unit that a district may join. A special meeting of the ratepayers may then be called by the Department of Education for the purpose of consulting on the question of joining the unit designated by the Boundaries Commission.
