PRICES AT THE ASYLUM.

SOME of our farmers complain that twenty-five cents per bushel are being paid for potatoes at the Hospital for the Insane to certain friends and supporters of the Liberal Government, while only eighteen cents per bushel can be obtained at the market in Charlottetown. We are unable to either affirm or deny the truth of the report, and can only say that it is in accord with Liberal traditions. But it seems to us that with three or four hundred acres of land at their disposal and all the teams, tools and implements of a farm, the Government ought to be able to raise plenty of potatoes for the supply of the hospital at a less cost than even eighteen cents a bushel and besides furnish wholesome employment in hoeing, digging, etc., to those of the harmless lunatics who have been used to farm work.

SIR WILFRID'S PROMISE.

SHORTLY before the last general election, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, speaking at Lindsay, Ontario said:

"There shall be a plebiscite, and the will of the people will be ascertained, and whatever the will of the people may be, it will be the duty of the Government to carry that will into execution."

This is the clear and definite promise of the Premier. We presume that the prohibitionists will hold him to it.

But the crooked course of the government in respect to prohibition must lead to friction among the Liberals. Speaking at Valleyfield, a few days before the plebiscite was held, Mr. Geoffrion, a prominent member of the Cabinet said:

"The prohibitionists may have their plebiscite, but they will have no prohibition."

Whether the Liberal party will fulfill Sir Wilfrid's promise or hold to Mr. Geoffrion's pledge remains to be seen.

It is satisfactory, at all events, to note that the Guardian has returned to its position as a champion of national prohibition. We hope that it will be able to keep Sir Wilfrid up to his promise.

TURN THEM OUT!

HARPER'S WEEKLY believes that the politicians of the United States are not rising to their new responsibilities. It says:

"In spite of the fact that we are facing a colonial problem, and that we have already acquired distant territories for which no government has been provided, the politicians are taking no steps whatever to arrange a proper system of colonial government. Such a system must have for its basis a permanent colonial service, otherwise our colonial governments will not only reflect but will exaggerate all the faults that obtain in our domestic affairs. These distant governments will be carried on by the 'b'ys,' who, far away from home, will not even be under the restraint of public opinion as expressed by the daily newspapers. Not only is it true that our politicians are not considering this problem at all, but they are actually urging the President to revise the civil service list in order that he may take some offices out of the classified list, in which they are now included. In other words, the politicians, instead of raising to new responsibilities, are insisting upon falling further and further below the old ones."

This statement is not reassuring as to the success of the new departure of the Great Republic. But the people of the United States have the same right and privilege as the people of Canada,—they can turn out the politicians who, having been weighed, are found wanting. The States, as well as Canada, have plenty of able men for the public service and they are not compelled to retain those who fail to come up to the standard.

—It is estimated that the cost of the United States navy next year will be \$47,065,475. Like the public debts under our Liberal governments, the cost of the American navy "do keep creeping up."

NEWS NOTES.

Mrs Langtry is about to take up her residence in California where she will spend the remainder of her days.

A dispatch from China says: It would not be surprising in view of Li Hung Chang's powerful influence at the court and with the empress dowager if the great statesman should become the successor of the murdered emperor, in fact, and emperor or also in name. The dowager expresses no disposition to appoint a ruler from among the princes of the dynasty, and rumors are current that Li Hung Chang will assume the imperial throne.

The activity of Miss Helen Gould in the public service has been recognized by the municipal assembly of the City of New York, in resolutions, passed September 13, which take note of her gift of a war fund of \$100,000 to the national government, and of her "practical and womanly interest in the welfare of our sick and wounded sailors and soldiers by personal administration and generous helpfulness," and direct the city clerk to convey to her the assurance of the assembly's gratitude and admiration.

Governor Tanner, of Illinois, has convictions, and the courage of them, about the naming of the battle-ships. He thinks that the old-fashioned christening with a bottle of champagne implies "no desecration of the laws of temperance, and is a ceremony from which no evil can possibly come." He reasons that while wine continues to be used in the communion-service in our churches it cannot be regarded as too abhorrent a fluid to spill at the launching of a ship. He has embodied these sentiments in a very courteous and complimentary letter which he has sent to reply to one received from a certain of the officers of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, requesting him to have the Illinois christened with water. As it was Governor Tanner who invited Miss Letter to name the ship, his decision in the matter would seem to relieve Miss Letter of all responsibility as to the details of the ceremony. "If left to me," he says, "the Illinois will be christened according to the time-honored custom. Governor Tanner, however, was not the last resource of the W C T U ladies. Failing of satisfactory assurance from him, they appealed to Secretary Long, who referred them to the contractors, who, he said, had entire charge of the vessel until it was completed and turned over to the Government. So a letter has been sent to them, which may possibly prove the final appeal in the matter.

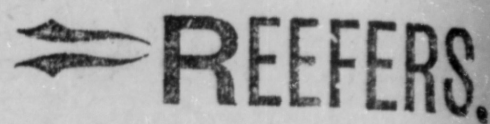

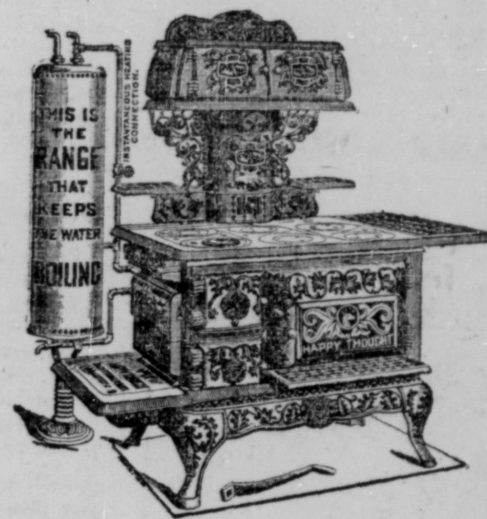
