FRIDAY, Oct. 3.—The first really practical sewing machine was the invention of Elias Howe, an American mechanic of Cambridge, Massachusetts, about 1841. This was improved and introduced into England as Thomas' shuttle machine, but now his name is forgotten. Elias Howe was 47 when he closed his useful career, Oct. 3, 1867. There is said to have been patented a boot and shoe sewing machine in 1790, by one Thomas Saint. Similar inventions are ascribed to Duncan, 1804; Adams and Dodge (American), 1818; Timonier (French), 1834; and Walter Hunt, also 1834.

The Boers to be Suppressed.

LONDON, Oct. 2. Early Derby, Secretary of State for the Colonies, has sent a cable despatch to Sir H. Robinson, Governor of Cape of Good Hope, to report immediately what resources may be necessary to suppress the inroads of the Boers. Lord Wolseley will on his return from Egypt be sent on an expedition to crush the Boers.

Beware of the English.

LONDON, Oct. 2. Jules Volles, the celebrated Commander, in an article bids Germans and Frenchmen to beware of rousing the dormant spirit of Englishmen. He says, although England has no immediate standing army, in the event of war, soldiers would spring from the ground.

The War in China Almost Over.

PARIS, Oct. 2. At a meeting of the Cabinet Council to-day, Prime Minister Ferry assured his colleagues that the occupation of Kelung by Admiral Courbet would finish the French operations in China. He states he had reason to believe peace would soon follow that event.

A Steamer on Fire.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 2. One of the steamers plying on the Volga River took fire yesterday at Kwatroma, and set fire to other vessels, causing the loss of several million roubles' worth of property, and killing or injuring some dozen persons.

Conley Wants to Row Teemer.

BOSTON, Oct. 2. P. S. Conley authorizes the statement that he will row John Teemer a sculler's race of four miles with a turn, on an allowance of ten seconds' start. He has posted his money.

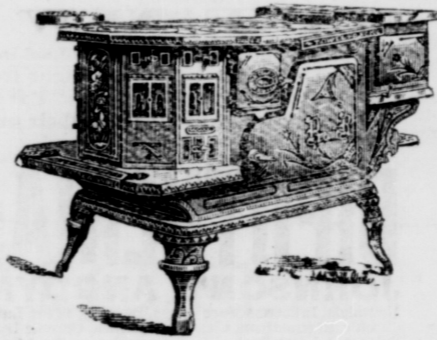
