

Yanks Gain On Chicago; Boston Defeats Indians

Things were almost back to normal in the American League Thursday.

New York Yankees ended the nonsense and whacked Kansas City 11-4, regaining a 6½-game lead over the idle Chicago White Sox. Ted Williams had two hits as Boston defeated Cleveland 11-3. And Frank Lary, last year's top winner, won his third in a row with a four-hit shutout as Detroit beat Baltimore 4-0.

The only thing out of order was the fact Cleveland's Early Wynn lost his fifth straight for a 13-15 record. It's the first time the veteran right-hander, overworked because of Tribe injuries, has lost 15 since 1944, when he was 8-19 in his last season with Washington.

New York Giants, with Willie Mays and Hank Aaron still at it, rapped Chicago Cubs 6-2 in the only National League game.

LOST TWO

The Yankees, who lost their first two games of the series at Kansas City after taking 16 of 17 from the A's, scored six in the third with ex-Athletic Harry Simpson hitting

a grand-slammer. In the two defeats, it had been ex-Yankee pitchers who did the job.

Williams, who had been 1-for-10, added a point in his four trips for a .36 mark while the Red Sox tagged 14 hits, one Jackie Jensen's 13th homer. Mike Fornieles won his eighth, striking out seven and blanking the Indians on five hits for eight innings.

Lary, who was 21-13 last season, gained a 7-15 record and the first shutout by the Tiger staff since May 14. He walked none, struck out three and faced only 29 batters while giving up nothing but singles. The Orioles jamed three of them into the fourth, but Bob Nieman hit into an inning-ending doubleplay.

Mays and Aaron, both homering for the second successive day, banged two-run shots off loser Dick Drott and reliever Bob Anderson. It was Mays' 28th, Sauer's 21st. Mays also had two doubles, for a 3-for-4 day and a .332 average.

BROOKLYN (AP) — Right-hander Lew Burdette, given a quick lead by Hank Aaron's three-run 35th homer, gained his first Ebbets Field victory in two

years Thursday night as Milwaukee's first-place Braves whipped third-place Brooklyn 6-1.

The loss, in the opener of a crucial three-game series, plunked the Dodgers 7½ games behind.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh's lowly Pirates thrashed Cincinnati Redlegs 8-3 Thursday night to give the once pennant-contending team its 10th consecutive defeat, longest losing streak of the National League this season.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Rookie Billy Muffett saved a 6-5 victory for St. Louis Cardinals over Philadelphia Thursday night, shutting out the Phillies in the final four innings.

Veteran Stan Musial suffered a muscle spasm in his left shoulder in the fifth inning and had to retire for the night. It was announced that X-rays will be taken today to determine whether the injury would keep the league's leading hitter, and the Cards' pennant hopes, sidelined for long. Musial was hitless in three trips before retiring, dropping his average to .340, eight points ahead of New York's Willie Mays.

Robinson Not To Fight Basilio

NEW YORK (AP)—Rebuffed in his plea for intervention by Governor Averell Harriman, middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson Thursday reiterated he will not fight Carmen Basilio Sept. 23 unless the International Boxing Club meets his terms for theatre television.

"The commission suspend me. Vacate my title, or do what they want, but they won't get me to fight the way things are," said Robinson after hearing the news from Albany.

Robinson said that he doesn't think the Monday meeting called by Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, will settle the dispute.

Harriman's press secretary, Charles Van Devander, told Robinson that the dispute involved "contractual matters which the governor could not try to interpret."

James D. Norris, president of the I.B.C. repeated as far as he is concerned the fight is still on. The squabble between Sugar Ray and the I.B.C. involves not only which outfit should handle the theatre-television but an interpretation of the contract. Robinson said there was an agreement that he had to okay any deal for television and radio. Norris said Robinson signed a commission contract which gives the promoter the exclusive right to handle this phase.

Hasn't Missed Championship Fight As Yet

SCHENECTADY, N.Y. (AP)—"I'm thinking I could be flying off that way for 15 seconds of fighting, but I just gotta go."

Dan Frederick, 74, says he hasn't missed a heavyweight championship fight since the Dempsey-Carpentier match in 1921. He boarded a plane Wednesday night to fly nearly 3,000 miles for the Patterson-Radnor fight in Seattle Thursday night.

Frederick, a retired tavern-keeper, estimates he has seen more than 2,000 fights in all classes.

Stewart Streit Upset By Kabler

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (CP)—Defending champion Marlene Stewart Streit of Toronto was defeated Thursday in the quarterfinals of the U.S. women's amateur golf tournament. Oregon's Carole Jo Kabler bounced the Canadian tournament veteran in a 5 and 4 upset victory.

Miss Kabler, the 19-year-old U.S. junior champion from Roseburg, Ore., earned a semi-final berth by outbitting the champion from 30 ft 50 yards a hole and making the most of a deadly approach game.

Mrs. Streit, 22, didn't win a hole as Carole Jo shot a one-under-par 37 on the front nine of the Del Paso Country Club course and shot par golf the final five holes.

Musial, who has given up previous plans to rest himself by skipping occasional games, has 17 homers in his last 32 games at bat. Bidding for a seventh league batting title, he led the league with a .342 average going into Thursday night's game and was in front with 97 runs batted in.
