NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Typhoid fever is reported very prevalent at Winnipeg.

—Just before leaving Paris Mr. Tarte announced that he was making for Canada, and that soon there would be "the smell of powder in the air." When Tarte comes the big gun of the Government will be here.

—The St. John Telegraph says that the Liberal party only gave an pledge, and kept them all, whereupon the Sun remarks that "leaders of the party may have made other pledges, but they don't count. The statement of the present day are apparently like Artemas Ward, not responsible for debts of their own contracting."

—Montreal Gazette: Before the overthrow of 1891 in this province the "old" Liberals refused to see that there was anything wrong in the Mercier Government administration. As soon as the voting returns were in they had their eyes opened. History will repeat itself. They will soon learn what Tarteism is and what it has done for Laurierism.

—The Maharajah of Gwalior has emulated Lord Strathcona in undertaking to fully equip a hospital ship for China at the expense of twenty lakhs of rupees, which, at the present rate of exchange, would be equivalent to between £120,000 and £130,000. He made the offer on behalf of himself, his mother and his wife in testimony of their loyalty to the Queen-Empress; and it is another evidence of the feeling of devotion to the sovereign that prevails in every corner of the Empire.

—Mr. Tarte's paper, La Patrie, says the two Canadians who disgraced themselves and their country in Africa were Englishmen, Ontario men, and one of them a Torontonian. The organ intimates that an English-speaking man alone would be guilty of the offence charged. Upon which the Mail and Empire apply remarks that: "It is a mean thing, but characteristically Tarte-like, to asperse a great and patriotic people because of the sins of the two men."

—Farm mortgages are said to be less numerous than they were four or five years ago. The circumstance, if true, is another justification of the policy of the Conservative party. Under that policy the mortgage gradually disappears, unless indeed it is laid on for the purpose of securing new plant. The Mail and Empire remarks that "had there been no additional taxes the mortgage would have dropped more rapidly than it is said to be doing. The Laurier Government takes \$12,500,000 more from the people in the shape of taxes than its predecessors or than its successors will. This \$12,500,000 if left with the people would have knocked off indebtedness to that amount."

The Winnipeg Tribune says Mr. Sifton is a national affliction, and adds that the Toronto Globe is after material advantages.

By the Huntingdon Gleaner the Ministers are charged with treachery to the party, and a call for their expulsion is made.

In New Brunswick the Pugsley influence is urging the Local Government to advance \$100,000 to a railway company in anticipation of an Ottawa subsidy that was not given at the last session of Parliament.

Mr. Ellis, M. P. for St. John, opposes the scheme. He looks upon it as irregular and as scented with corruption.

The Government organ now says Mr. Ellis is really hostile to Mr. Blair, and has only approved of some of his administrative Acts in order that he "might some day punch Mr. Blair under the ear."

Further, "Mr. Ellis would pose as an independent thinker, but he is only a kicker, who is generally supposed to kick himself every morning because he forgot to kick somebody else the day before. Kickers may have their uses, but up to the present time no one has discovered them to be of any use in a new country, where every man who desires progress must stand should to shoulder with his fellow and push up and on with a common object. There is not much room for a kicker in such a push."

So that Mr. Ellis is ordered out of "the push."

It is worthy of note that all the quarrels are about financial transactions. The sole exception to the rule was when the Ministers at Ottawa were at each other's throats on the question of aid to the Empire in a period of crisis.

He deliberately prolonged a religious conflict out of which no possible good could come to the minority in Manitoba, and deliberately humiliated and crucified the Orange Conservative because he believed that by courting the favour of a body of ecclesiastics in Quebec he could hold that province, and rule Canada in defiance of the views of his followers in Ontario.

PLOT AGAINST LORD ROBERTS

Fuller Account of the Intrigue

PRETORIA, August 11.—Everything was prepared in the plot to make Lord Roberts a prisoner and shoot the British officers; and the conspiracy was only discovered at the last moment.

The conspirators numbered about fifteen.

They had planned to set fire to the houses in the extreme western part of the city, hoping that the troops would be concentrated there.

The plan was that the conspirators were forcibly to enter all houses occupied by British officers, these having been previously marked, to kill the occupants.

All the Boer sympathizers were acquainted with the plot and several had been told off to secure the person of Lord Roberts and hurry with him to the nearest commando. Horses had been obtained for this purpose.

Then the British learned the names of the ringleaders, who were put under arrest. The affair has created a tremendous sensation.

A Hero of New Brunswick.

Many brave deeds have been done by Canada, soldiers in South Africa, but the men who go to war are not the only heroes. No deed of daring on the field of battle could surpass the heroism of John McKinnon, of Fairville, a suburb of St John, N. B., in saving the life of a fellow workman at the Gregory Mill, Grand Bay.

A 16-year-old boy named George Campbell, while feeding sawdust and other refuse of the mill into a fiery furnace through a hopper at the top lost his balance and fell backward into the fire. What followed is related by the St. John Telegraph. John McKinnon, taking in the situation at a glance, and thinking not of the suffering and even danger of life that he would encounter, rushed to rescue young Campbell.

But one way presented itself—Campbell must burn to death or else his rescuer must reach him through the hopper down which the boy had fallen into the fire. McKinnon saw this and faced all the danger in order that he might rescue the lad. He went head foremost down the hopper, while other mill hands held his feet. There he was suspended over a sea of fire, the flames reaching up to his face and arms, which were outstretched to reach young Campbell. McKinnon did not flinch, but carried to completion the heroic act he had begun. Campbell clutched him he caught the boy, and together they were drawn from the fiery furnace. Campbell was very badly burned; in fact there is hardly a part of his body but was reached by the fire. His rescue was prompt, however, and therefore the flames had not time to burn deeply. He lies at his father's home, under care of Dr. J H Grey of Fairville, who holds out good hopes for his recovery. McKinnon, who so heroically rescued him, escaped with little injury.

The Telegraph concludes its account of this brave deed with the statement that John McKinnon's fellow employees think he deserves a medal.

He does deserve a medal, and something more. A man who has such presence of mind and courage should get one in the world. We wish success to John McKinnon. Canada has reason to be proud of him.—Montreal Star.

Indian Soldiers For China.

SIMLA, August 11.—Excluding the fourth brigade, the strength of the forces proceeding to China is 446 British officers, 1,664 non-commissioned and native officers; 13,976 men; 11,850 followers; 1,150 drivers; 2,520 horses; 4,300 ponies and mules; 12 guns; 14 maxims, and 1,800 imperial service troops.

It is expected that the entire force will have sailed before the middle of next month.
