Dredging Begins For Marine Slip

GEORGETOWN — The J.P. Porter firm of Montreal and Halifax moved dredging equipment into Georgetown and work commenced last week on a Dominion government contract amounting to \$47,680 for the dredging connected with the new 600-ton marine railway slip to be built by the provincial government.

Dredging will also be carried out for the launching of the newly constructed dragger at Baulnahel Marine Ltd. here.

In all, some 16,000 cubic yards of material will be removed in the dredging operations and work is being carried out on a 24-hour a day schedule.
