

# Early Start On Color TV In Canada Is Recommended

OTTAWA (CP)—An early start on transmission of color TV in Canada was urged Monday by the electronics industry before the royal commission on broadcasting.

The sooner it is started, industry spokesmen said, the sooner will manufacturers be able to get on with the development and production of color receivers and bring down their price to Canadians.

Accusing broadcast authorities of having retarded the introduction of black and white TV unnecessarily, the Radio-Electronics Television Manufacturers' Association of Canada said an independent regulatory body for radio-TV should be set up and that one of its first jobs should be to speed the arrival of color video.

The three-man commission under chairman R. M. Fowler of Montreal, opening final Ottawa hearings after touring Canada, also heard opposition to a separate regulatory agency as sought by the private broadcasters.

The opposition came from the

Canadian Federation of Agriculture and from historian-professor A. R. M. Lower of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont. They declared the present system of broadcast is basically suited to Canadian needs and should be continued without fundamental changes.

The Federation of Agriculture and the Canadian Citizenship Council in separate briefs joined in urging that the CBC be kept free of political party influence.

The CBC now is the regulatory body for Canadian radio and TV, both for itself and the private stations.

The citizenship council threw in a suggestion that on occasion the national agency may have been subject to political influence by the present Liberal federal government, though it is responsible to Parliament rather than to the government.

Both it and the agriculture federation proposed that legislation be enacted so that it report directly to Parliament rather than through the revenue minister, as at present.

Chairman Fowler said that "the real question is, how do you

report directly to Parliament?" He thought anyone would go along with the idea that there should be no government interference. But, he asked, if a Crown agency such as the CBC were suddenly to become "wasteful and profligate," how could direct control be exercised by Parliament?

Norman Dowd, a director of the citizenship council, said that "the nearest we could get would be to report to a standing committee of Parliament."

Prof. Lower, in a 12,000-word brief, expressed fear of United States domination of the Canadian airwaves—and the minds of Canadians—if Canada let down the barriers as to the content of Canadian programs on this country's stations.

He said the only guarantee of Canada's continued national existence is the continued nationalization of such key sectors of Canadian life as radio and TV.

Canadians, he said, could slide "almost imperceptibly" into the American "gulf" under the influence of U.S. programs unless the amount of American programs on Canadian radio and TV were held down.

## Forest Management Is Need Forestry Conference Told

WINNIPEG (CP)—The completely scientifically-managed forest is practically non-existent in Canada, Lowell Besley of Montreal, chairman of the woodlands research department of the Pulp and Paper Research Institute of Canada, said today.

Addressing the opening session of the three-day national forestry conference, Mr. Besley said that the public and its elected representatives in the federal and provincial governments must accept a large measure of the blame for this situation.

However, the scientifically-managed forest was not far off if forest industries and governments could establish a working partnership.

Other first-day speakers—A. C. Price of Quebec, President of the Pulp and Paper Association, and M. J. Foley of Vancouver, president of Powell River Co. Ltd.—also criticized public and government attitudes.

SEE DEMAND UP

All, however, predicted increased demand and an expanding future for forest industries if required steps were taken.

Their comments were contained

in texts issued to the press in advance of delivery.

The conference, attended by some 75 representatives of industry, governments and national organizations, was called by the Canadian Forestry Association, with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, the Canadian Institute of Forestry and the Engineering Institute of Canada as co-sponsors.

Mr. Besley a former dean of the faculty of forestry, University of British Columbia, said in part: "The owners of any business must take the ultimate responsibility for its success or failure, and 94 per cent of the forested area of Canada is publicly owned."

"Although most of your forest officers have long since recognized the need of a positive forestry program to stimulate and obtain a sound management of crown forest land and timber, other agencies of your governments continue to think of them as a practically limitless and wasting resource."

IGNORE NEW GROWTH

"A large part of the energies of most of your provincial forest services is still devoted to collecting moneys for the provincial treasuries, with little or no effective provisions for new growth following cutting."

"Likewise, the federal government, whose current direct tax revenues from the forest industries amount to \$200,000,000 yearly, is spending in return less than \$10,000,000 on the forests."
