

Palladino Scores Winner In Third Period As Local Team Edges Fredericton Caps 3-2

The Charlottetown Islanders, by a wide margin in the first period but as it ended they found themselves trailing 1-0. The locals started to press from the opening whistle and had many good scoring opportunities in the first 10 minutes of play but were unable to beat a very dependable Plumber-Craig in the Caps' nets. Jim Shirley made a dazzling save off the stick of Tim Bliss shortly after the 12 minute mark. He fell to the ice on the play but failed to smother the puck and centreman Jerry Smith was "Johnny on the spot" to bang the rebound up over Jim and into the net for the first goal of the night. The score remained the same for the rest of the session.

Tim Bliss got the first of his two looking penalties at 5:36, but the Caps kept the locals so badly disorganized that they were unable to get a shot at Craig. Shirley again saved the game for Islanders as he stopped Nick Nicolle and Doug Hewey on close-in drives at 17:34.

The Islanders, with Copper Leyte, Wally Kullman and Jim Shirley, started to sustain the attack shortly after the middle session got underway. Wally, who had his best game of the season on local ice, was fooled neatly by Craig several times in the opening 10 minutes of the period, while Shirley came up with a nice stop off Bob Leger at 12:45.

INCREASE LEAD

The win for the Brklach gang increased their first place lead to six points over the second place Capitals and Ramblers and to 8 points from the cellar-dwelling Hawks. Only six minor penalties, three to each team, were handed out by referees Sonny MacDonald and Jackie Kane in the fast, cleanly-played contest. Both teams seemed unusually content to play hockey, six goals and try to win rather than to have their usual over-emphasized brawl.

Both goal-tenders, Shirley and Craig, were sensational all through the game with the Fredericton goalie turning aside a total of 41 drives off the sticks of Island players, while Jim Shirley was called upon 28 times. The win also gave Shirley sole possession of the best goals-against average in the league.

The sessions, which were opened by a brief talk on the aims of the school by Physical Fitness Director Bill Reid, who thanked the N.H.L. and M.A.H.A. for their cooperation in staging such schools, and then introduced Mr. Voss, were attended by 44 candidates from the following centres: Miscouche, Belmont, H. M. C. S. Shearwater, Dartmouth, Summersville, H.M.C.S. Stadacona, Halifax, Moncton, Summerside, Crapaud, Kensington, Emerald, Charlottetown, Cambridge, Murray Harbor, North Parkton, N.B., South Ruston, Hampshire, Rustico, Bonshaw, Pelly, and Southey.

Horses Continue To Lose Ground

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canada's horse population has been reduced to a half-century low by another year of machine age progress.

Total number of horses on Canadian farms dropped to 1,096,000 in 1953, the bureau of statistics estimated Monday.

This was the lowest figure in the half-century history of the rise and fall of old hobbin. The 1953 total was down by 84,000 from mid-1952 and was less than one-third the peak of 3,544,000 in 1921.

Most of the remaining horses were on the Prairies and in the two central provinces of Ontario and Quebec. But even in these big horse areas, the numbers continued to decline.

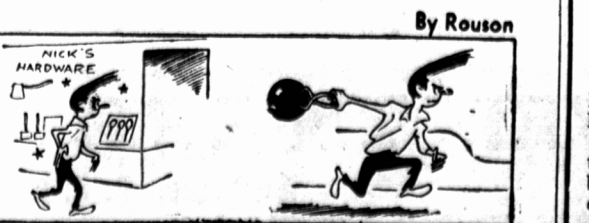

Islanders Turned Down By ACSHL

The Prince Edward Islanders Hockey Club yesterday requested to the ACSHL that if they benched Vip Palladino for eight games, effective immediately, would the league officially recognize such as the suspension portion of the penalty which league president Babbitt Parlee handed to Palladino several weeks ago? The request was made by the local club due to a CAHA ruling which shows that Mr. Parlee has no authority to allow Palladino to play after he had been given a match penalty for striking referee Sonny MacDonald with a stick, until his case had been thoroughly dealt with.

Concerning the request by the Islanders club, the following statement was received from ACSHL first vice-president Jack Fenety:

"No segregation of the Palladino sentence is permissible, as one is synonymous with the other. If the player Palladino sat out games this week and a total of eight games, and your club forwarded a bond in the amount of the fines, your club's appeal would be no longer valid. There being no change in the issue, I see no point in not letting the player continue playing who led the scorers with a brace of goals, one of which tied the game and the other was the winner. Boxing Club To Sue Sports Magazine For Five Million

CHICAGO (AP)—James D. Norris Jr., president of the International Boxing Club, Inc., said Monday he has advised his attorneys to file a \$5,000,000 libel and conspiracy suit against Sports Illustrated magazine.

Sports Illustrated last week carried an article by ex-heavyweight boxer Harry Thomas. The article said Norris "fixed" the Thomas-Max Schmeling fight at Madison Square Garden, Dec. 13, 1937, and Thomas' fight with Tony Galento in Philadelphia Nov. 14, 1938.

The 48-year-old head of the IBC said the suit will be filed against the magazine "as well as all parties connected with the libelous and malicious conspiracy to defame my character with the avowed purpose of outlawing boxing."

He named no individuals in his statement.

Whitlock Still Leads League

Roy (Buck) Whitlock of the league-leading Charlottetown Islanders continues to head the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League individual scoring parade after five weeks of play. Figures released Monday night by secretary-treasurer Robert (Bob) Chandler show the four-time Big Four scoring king with 48 points, five more than teammate Ray Leduc. Statistics do not include Monday's play in the four-team league.

The top four positions in the list of scorers is held by Charlottetown players. Bob Gray, who occupies third spot with 41 points, is the loop's top goal-getter with 21. Whitlock, who picked up six points on two goals and four assists—in last week's action is top play-maker with 32. Dave Kiley, Amherst Rambler, right-winger, also had a good week, picking up six scoring points to move from eighth spot to fourth. He has 31 points, one less than Charlottetown's Lorne Hennessey and Copper Leyte, who share fourth position with 32.

Moncton's Nick Pidsodny moved back into first place for goal-tending honors in the circuit. The veteran netminder allowed 11 goals to slip past him last week, while Jim Shirley of Charlottetown, who headed the parade the week before, was beaten 14 times.

In all, Nick has been scored on 95 times, for a total against average of 3.17, while Shirley has been bested 96 times for an average of 3.20. Both netminders have each two shutouts.

Danny O'Connor, Charlottetown defenceman, continues to head the badmen department with 115 minutes in the cooler. The Islanders are the most penalized club with 559 minutes.
