INQUEST INTO SCHOOL-GIRL'S DEATH HELD

A coroner's jury brought in the following verdict Saturday after hearing the evidence of twelve witnesses in an inquiry into the death of nine-year-old Shirley Smallwood, Bunbury school-girl fatally injured last Monday.

We hereby recommend that the case be further tried at the next session of the Supreme Court. We also recommend that greater vigilance be observed by drivers of motor vehicles in regard to brakes.

Dr. I. J. Yeo was the coroner. The jury was composed of P. J. Macdonald, foreman, R. H. MacNeil, Victor Ling, Murdoch Ross, Samuel Vail, J. Peter Macdonald and Harry James.

Dr. George F. Dewar, medical practitioner in Charlottetown, who examined and gave temporary treatment to the injured girl at the Hospital, was the first witness.

David Mutch, thirteen year old Bunbury school-boy was the next to give evidence. He was sitting on the school-garage when he heard a car roaring. He looked up and saw the car swerving back and forth trying to avoid the child, he thought.

Blake Livingstone, eight-year old school-boy, told how he had been playing ball with Shirley Smallwood and two others on the day of the accident. The ball went out on the road and Shirley went out after it.

George McLellan, Charlottetown, companion of Phillips' the day of the accident, was the next witness. He and Phillips had left Charlottetown about ten minutes to eleven on Monday, the day of the accident.

Dr. Donald Campbell, who assisted Dr. Dewar dress the wounds and put the injured legs in temporary splints told the jury that the cause of death had been "due to brain injury and hemorrhage and shock due to the multiple injuries to his body."

Patrick Morris, special R. C. M. P. constable, told of taking Phillips' car from in front of McLellan Bros. store Monday afternoon. He took it to the Barracks on Prince Street.

Wendell Mutch, Bunbury farmer, eye-witness to the accident, was the next witness. He was driving home with a horse and truck wagon from Town Monday shortly before one o'clock and when near the Bunbury School he noticed a car approaching in the opposite direction.

Peter L. Jey, R. C. M. P. constable, told of going to the scene of the accident on Monday. He had been at the barracks when Phillips reported the accident. A short time after Constable Morris drove into the back yard with a Ford car.

Elizabeth Jenkins, teacher at the Bunbury School where Shirley Smallwood was a pupil, was the next witness. She recalled the case drawn to the accident about eight or nine minutes to one, she said. It was all over when she came out of the school.

Defective Corporal Frederick Cordwell of the Mounted Police was the last witness. He told of measurements he had made at Bunbury School on Monday, the day of the accident. Mr. Wendell Mutch, David Mutch and Blake Livingstone all agreed as to where the body had been found.

Baseball Fan Killed By Truck YARMOUTH, May 24—An effort to be an Yarmouth fan for the first time failed for the season on Monday, May 25, brought death to Gerald Goudey, 21, native of Yarmouth, in the first auto fatality of the year last night when he was pinned beneath an overturned auto truck and crushed to death near Glenwood.

Four other persons in the truck were injured, two of them seriously. Charles Rigby, driver of the light delivery, sustained multiple bruises, his wife, Mrs. Charles Rigby is a patient in Yarmouth hospital with a fractured skull and only a 50-50 chance of recovering. Miss Betty Gray friend of the Rigby family is in hospital suffering from lacerations and multiple bruises, and Walter Avrie, companion of the dead man, suffered injuries to his arm and head when he was thrown clear of the wreck. All were natives of Yarmouth.

BLACK LEGION RULED BY TERRORISM Ramifications Grow In Investigation Into "Ritual" Slaying. (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DETROIT, May 25—Investigations of the Black Legion multiplied today as victims of mob terrorism protesting under promise of protection, fled with new accounts of slayings, floggings, and arson by masked night riders wearing the death's head insignia of the secret order.

Charges that the outlawed brotherhood, which one investigator declared has an armed membership of 135,000 in Michigan alone, sought political dominance through scourge and pistol brought official inquiries in two large Michigan cities.

Under another decision, the government lost in its effort to reduce service charges for buying and selling livestock at the Kansas city stock yards. In an unanimous opinion by Chief Justice Hughes, the court said secretary of agriculture Wallace had not given the commission men an adequate hearing.
