Another Important Meeting Decides in Favor of the Liberal-Conservatives.

POLITICAL MEETING AT DUNDAS. A large, influential and enthusiastic meeting was held on Wednesday evening last at the Court House, Dundas—Donald Morrison, Esq., in the chair.

The candidates were present and addressed the meeting. Speeches were also delivered by Wm. Welsh, Esq., J. G. Sterns, Esq., and others. It was moved by Mr. Hunter, and seconded by Mr. John McDougald—

That A. C. McDonald, Esq., and Dr. Muttart be nominated to represent King's County in the Dominion House of Commons.

Dr. McIntyre and Mr. McFayden were also nominated. The meeting then divided, when seven-eighths of the electors present voted for McDonald and Muttart.

The chances for the Grits are daily becoming "small by degrees and beautifully less."

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, Sept. 4. The "Pall Mall Gazette," in its leading article inveighs against Condon's (Fenian) release at the solicitation of the United States as unwise and undignified. It says the pertinacity of the three preferred requests for his release is somewhat disrespectful; that Minister Welsh's letter borders on the offensive, and in places, oversteps the line, and approaches the free and easy. If Condon's health was reason enough for releasing him, he ought to have been released without American intervention. The intercession effects matters only for the worse; yielding to it simply appears to establish the principle that any justly sentenced criminal who can pretend a political motive for his crime and can succeed in enlisting the intercession of a sufficiently pertinacious Government, may count upon the remission of a sentence for which his less fortunately placed fellow convicts may petition in vain.

At a banquet in Lancaster, to-night, at which the Marquis of Hartington was present, it was rumored that Parliament would be dissolved within three weeks, as it is more advantageous for the Government to have the elections take place under the old register of votes than under the new one now being completed.

PARIS, Sept. 4. The Notre Dame Cathedral was crowded in every part yesterday, during the funeral ceremony on the occasion of the anniversary of the death of Thiers. About 8,000 persons gained admission to the edifice, and large numbers were in the streets, but there was no confusion or disorder. After the ceremony, Madame Thiers went to the cemetery of Pere La Chase, where there was a great demonstration of floral offerings at Thiers' tomb.

PARIS, Sept. 4. The Marquis of Salisbury is here and has had an interview with M. Waddington, Minister of Foreign Affairs. It is reported that they will meet again shortly to discuss Egyptian affairs.

Midhat Pasha is expected in Paris to-night. He will interview Salisbury and Waddington to-morrow, and then proceed to see Bismarck and Andrássy.

The manager of the Le Pays (Bonapartist journal) of which Paul de Cassignac is editor, has been summoned before the courts for insulting President McMahon.

MEMPHIS, Sept. 4. Undertakers report 96 interments for 24 hours ending at 6 p. m. Of these, 93 deaths were caused by yellow fever. Seventy-six were whites and twenty colored citizens. The city is one vast charnel house.

SYDNEY, Sept. 4. The rising of the natives in New Caledonia are not yet quelled. The insurgents at the last attack stubbornly maintained their positions in the mountains.

A SIGNAL VICTORY FOR LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVES.

To the Editor of the Examiner. DEAR SIR,—On Monday last it was rumored that a political meeting was to be held at Victoria Cross on Tuesday evening. But no notice of such meeting was to be seen, and no person seemed to know anything definite about it. Besides, as it was understood that the Opposition candidates would be in Charlottetown at that evening, we came to the conclusion that it was only rumor after all. Towards evening on Tuesday there seemed to be unusual activity in the camp. Officials were seen hurrying to an fro, attired in their best, carrying pamphlets, budgets and documents of all descriptions. Some one suggested that they were holding "Penny Readings" in aid of the Secret Service Fund, somewhere. The long procession being organized, marshalled by our worthy Postmaster and the famous Joseph Campbell bringing up the rear, moved onward in the direction of Victoria Cross. Some of our Conservative friends thought it expedient that we should go and watch the proceeding of this ominous procession should they really be holding a meeting under such sneaking and underhand circumstances. On our arrival at Victoria Cross we found that were assembled about 120 electors, and Mr. Malcolm McFayden on the platform vehemently denouncing the policy pursued by Sir John and his followers. By his side sat Monah Rowe, Esq., Dr. Robertson, Roderick Munroe, Esq., (of Georgetown), who each in turn vented their wrath against the policy of the Conservatives, thinking that in the absence of both Conservative candidates they would misrepresent their policy with impunity.

A few of the Liberal-Conservative electors seeing the undue advantage taken of their men, took up the cudgels in defence of the Opposition; and, notwithstanding the formidable array of "Old stagers" that were against them, they cornered their opponents in a surprising manner. Judging from the marked attention with which they were listened to, and the hearty applause that greeted each of the Opposition speakers as they took their seats, there must have been five to one in favour of the Conservative candidates.

It was moved by Mr. John McQueer, and seconded by Mr. Malcolm Martin and several others: "That A. C. McDonald, Esq., and Dr. Muttart be our candidates for the Dominion House of Commons." Mr. McFayden suggested that some person should put him (McF.) in nomination, but no one responded. The Conservatives then asked that their motion be put to the meeting, but the Chairman refused to do so, giving no satisfactory reasons for his conduct. The Conserv. was again urged that a division be taken, but the Chairman, prompted by the Grit leaders, again refused, knowing that they were shamefully in the minority. Three cheers were then given for the Chairman, three cheers for Sir John, and three rousing cheers for McDonald and Muttart, and the meeting dispersed.

Thus, after all their drumming up of forces, their army of officials, their formidable array of platform orators, this Grit meeting resulted in a signal victory for the Conservatives.
