THE Blue Book just issued on Afghan affairs leaves no shadow of doubt that the hand of Russia has been the prime mover of the whole opposition which the British have encountered in Afghanistan during the present Eastern campaign.

LAST YEAR 646 people were divorced at San Francisco, 104 of the decrees being granted on the ground of cruelty and desertion. In the same city 297 persons came to their death by violence, 88 of whom committed suicide.

IT is understood in Halifax that Rev. D. D. Currie, editor of the Wesleyan, has accepted an invitation to become pastor of the Centenary Methodist Church, St. John. He will likely be succeeded on the Wesleyan by Rev. T. Watson Smith, at present assistant book steward.

By the death of Horace D. Perrin, of Marshall, Michigan, who died intestate, it is quite probable that Mr. Daniel S. Perrin, the well known confectioner of London, Ont., and Mr. Samuel Perrin, of Detroit, will share the fortune of the deceased, which is placed at \$4,000,000 in cash and property.

TRYON WOOLLEN MILLS.—The Tryon Woollen Mills have obtained from the Government the contract to supply the Poor House with the following goods:—60 pairs of blankets, 200 yards of drugget and 300 yards of cloth. These Mills are doing an excellent business, and the proprietors, who are enterprising men, deserve the patronage of all who want to encourage home manufacture.—S. Journal.

A small market today. Prices were as follows: Beef (small) 5 to 12 cts. per lb.; beef (gr.) from 3 1/2 to 8 cents per lb.; mutton, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; pork (per lb.) from 7 to 9 cents; pork (per carcass) from 5 to 6 cents; geese, from 50 to 60 cents each; Turkeys, from 70 to \$1.50; chickens, from 50 to 75 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 18 to 24 cents per lb.; butter (tub) from 17 to 20 cent per lb.; flour, per 100 lbs., from \$3.00 to \$3.50; oatmeal, from \$2.50 to \$2.75; potatoes, from 16 to 20 cents per bushel; hay, from 33 to 34 cents per 100 lbs; oats, 30 cents.

THE Lord Mayor of London having announced on the 17th January to a deputation that waited upon him that he had supplies of meat for distribution among the unemployed, was confronted the next day by three hundred starving men. Each applicant was interrogated by an officer, and only those who had wives and families were helped. The Mayor's resources were limited to a few hundred small tins of American corned beef that had been sent to him by a company, and were soon exhausted.

ROYAL ARCADE.—This order, which was instituted in Boston, in November, 1877, has had quite a steady and healthy growth since its commencement, to-day numbering 18,000 members, and extending its benefits throughout nearly every State in the Union, and two or three Provinces in Canada. Massachusetts has a membership of nearly four thousand, and under the efficient management of S. A. Libbey, Grand Regent of State, a much larger addition is to be expected during the year. The order is noted for its promptness in paying its indebtedness, and is in a healthy condition on this Island.

SAYS the Kingston News:—"In the Ontario Legislature a few days ago, the Hon. Alexander Morris pointed out, as the result of an analysis of the returns laid before the House, that the total number of votes received by Government candidates at the general election on the 5th of June last, was 124,840, and the number received by Opposition candidates, 122,509. 'In other words,' said Mr. Morris, 'the Government had been placed in power by 4,000 votes. The Opposition, although a minority in the House, represented nearly one-half of the electorate of the Province who had polled their votes. Every member of the Opposition represented nearly double the number of votes that the Government side did.'"

Discussion of Foreign Affairs.

The Newfoundland Fishery Dispute.

OPENING OF THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT.

A FINE DISPLAY!!

Special dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, Feb. 12.

Lord Lynton (Liberal) was elected to Parliament, from Barnstable, by 96 majority over Sir Robert Corden (Conservative).

The Chancellor of the Exchequer has denied the despatch stating that a Treaty had been signed, by which Persia would be permitted to occupy Herat, in return for her engagement to assist England in Afghanistan.

The communications on the subject of releasing Persia from her Treaty engagement, and not to take possession of Herat, had been under consideration with Persia and a decision has not yet been reached, therefore it is inconvenient to make any statement.

Robert Bourke, under Secretary of the Foreign Department, replying to a question as to the claim of the United States for alleged damages by Newfoundland fishermen in Fortune Bay to the Massachusetts fishing fleet, said that no measures had been taken relative to the pecuniary claim, which is still under consideration. No action had been taken for abrogating or amending the clause 33 of the Treaty of Washington relative to Canadian and Newfoundland inshore fisheries.

OTTAWA, Feb. 12.

The weather was very mild and the streets sloppy to day. The outside demonstration was therefore somewhat less enthusiastic than last year, and, owing to the restrictions in the issue of tickets, the galleries were less crowded. There was the usual display of fine costumes among the ladies admitted to seats on the floor of the Senate, and the dress circle in the gallery was a new and attractive feature. Sir John Macdonald was conspicuous in the splendid uniform of Imperial Privy Councillor.

Mr. Blake was warmly cheered by both sides on being introduced. The rumors of a change in the Leadership of the Liberal Party are considered improbable, inasmuch as Mr. McKimzie's health appears quite recovered.

Invitations to the State Dinner to-night include Ministers, ex-Ministers, Deputy Ministers, Lieutenant Governors and the Premiers of the different Provinces.

Mr. Colby, on Monday, will introduce a Bill to repeal the Insolvent Act.

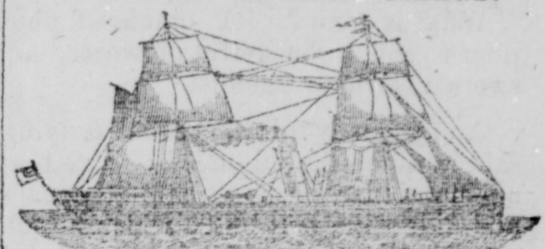
