

# Canadian Mining Companies Seek To Attract More Men

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian mining companies, plagued by a manpower shortage, are stepping up efforts to attract more men to the mining industry.

The shortage is expected to be acute in the operations of many mines. Skilled and well as unskilled workers are in short supply.

Falconbridge, the world's No. 2 nickel producer, in an effort to attract professional men to the industry, has mailed a 14-page booklet to students in Canadian, United States and British universities.

The booklet, entitled Graduate to Falconbridge Nickel Mines Ltd., outlines the opportunities available in the Canadian mining industry particularly with Falconbridge.

It explains the challenges of mining, and also says that mining camps no longer are wooden shacks in the backwoods without modern conveniences.

The booklet shows pictures of the social amenities available to the families of mine workers.

## French-English Difficulties Heard In Commission Staff

OTTAWA (CP) — Rumbles of French-English friction are emanating from the staff of the royal commission on bilingualism and biculturalism, which was set up to find ways of reducing such friction.

Two rival factions among junior research workers have "leaked" to reporters bitter memos they sent to the 10-member commission.

Commission officials have declined all comment, beyond issuing a few statistics showing that French- and English-speaking researchers are roughly equal in number at all levels of the staff.

The B-B inquiry is entering its final phase with the processing of some 174 research projects.

Some French-Canadian researchers recently complained in a memo to the commission that they are confined to translation and clerical civil service officers.

With the price of gold fixed at \$35 U.S. an ounce and the cost of production climbing steadily most Canadian gold mining companies only exist by government subsidy.

The mining industry has asked the federal government to allow immigrants to be brought into the country to work in mines, but the government puts a minimum grade 10 education limit on immigrants brought in for this purpose.

Minister of Trade, Ontario George Wardrobe, said the manpower shortage should be "the cause of very great concern."
