Affairs in Quebec.

QUEBEC politicians are keeping themselves at fever heat. although the thermometer occasionally shows the fluid to be fifteen below zero. At the present time it is everybody's victory, and that, perhaps, is the reason why so much energy is being expended by both of the great parties in the fight. Mr. de Boucherville's friends speak confidently of securing power with a majority of twenty. They say the boodle charges are bound to send Mr. Mercier to the wall. On the other hand Mr. Mercier says he will go back and have a majority of at least fifteen and adds that he never made a truer statement. The Royal Commission investigations, Mr. Mercier affirms, will not have the slightest effect upon the country constituencies. All that, however, will be decided on March 8. There are 74 counties in the province. The Conservatives have selected fifty-nine candidates, so far, and the Liberals fifty-one. Five of the latter will run as independents, four of them having repudiated Mr. Mercier and the fifth is to be heard from. George W. Stephens, a leading Montreal Liberal, who is running for Huntingdon, in his address to the electors, says:—

"I believe firmly in the doctrine of country before party, and recognise above all things our need of an honest administration of the public funds and the complete extinction of corruption. If you select me, it must be with the understanding that I am free to support an honest Administration, under whatever name it may be designated."

The State of Trade.

Trade in this province is anything but brisk at the present time. In the city the complaint is general. The bad roads have a great deal to do with that, however. From all we can gather the state of trade in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick is not very promising. The Montreal correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle, speaking under this head, says: "The representative of one of the largest boot and shoe houses in this city, also representing a rubber goods business, returned from the east a few days ago and stated that he had been out since the first of this year on the road and had not taken a single order." Upper Canadian paper all sing the same song. Several very heavy failures have taken place in Montreal during the past few days.

The anomalous position of the Church of England as the state church will be illustrated again in the progress of the bill for improving its discipline promised by the government. A parliament made up of Scotch Presbyterians, Irish Roman Catholics, English dissenters, Welsh Methodists, Quakers, Jews and even atheists, will be asked to decide on what is good for the welfare of a religious organization, which a majority of them care nothing about and a few of them actually hate.—Gazette.

PASTOR CHINIQUY'S APPEAL.

He is Still in the Gap, and Asks His Friends for Help.

Very Dear Orange Brethren and Friends,—When on this solemn first day of a new year, I consider what my God has done for me, and so many of my dear countrymen, these last thirty years, the first thing I do is to say with the old prophet, "Bless the Lord, O my soul! and let all that is within me bless His holy name."

The second thing is to remember how many of you have been the angels of the mercies of God towards us; and, from the bottom of my heart I ask our Heavenly Father to pour upon you His most abundant blessings.

When in 1858, surrounded by the small band of heroic soldiers, whom Christ had enrolled under His banners, at St. Anne, Illinois, I attacked the walls of the modern Babylon, many thought that we were a band of rash men who would soon be crushed under the giant arm of Rome. This would have surely been the case had not the God of the Gospel come to our help.

But now it is our unspeakable joy not only to see the victorious banners of the Cross floating on the beautiful hills of St. Anne, Illinois, but we count many towns, villages, and cities in the United States and Canada, where more than 100 faithful ministers (almost all converts from Rome) preach the saving truths of the gospel to more than 40,000 precious souls.

You will help me to bless the Lord, when I tell you that today there is not a single village, city or town from Halifax on the Atlantic, to San Francisco on the Pacific ocean, where you will not find some Roman Catholic families who have left the errors of popery to accept the gospel.

Three weeks ago when preaching the gospel to many of my countrymen settled at Eau Claire, in the State of Wisconsin, one of them said to me: "A few years ago having to go to Montreal on some business, I heard that you were preaching in your church in St. Catherine Street, where attempts were made almost every evening to murder you. Being asked to join the ranks of your would be murderers, I went to your church armed with a heavy maple stick to strike you. But, when in the church I saw a good number of strong young men also well armed to defend you, I whistled into my companion's ear that it was perhaps safer for us to be quiet. I dropped my stick on the floor, and I took a seat to hear what you had to say. You were speaking of our Saviour, Jesus Christ, and eternal life as being the gifts of God. Your address pleased me exceedingly, and the rest of the week I was one of the first to select a good place to hear you. The last day of your conference, you invited those who wanted a volume of the gospel to come forward—and I was one of those who took the holy book from your hands. The next day I took the cars to come back to my new home in Wisconsin. My only occupation on the way was to read the gospel; and my surprise was great when I found that everything you said against the church of Rome was correct. When back home, to make a long story short, I offered the gift to my wife, to my father and mother, to my three brothers and their wives, and after some weeks of hesitation they all accepted it. And today the Church of Rome has twenty seven members less, and the church of Christ counts twenty seven more members in Wisconsin."

When telling me these marvelous things, that dear countryman was in vain trying to stop the tears of joy which were rolling down his cheeks. The very next day two other Roman Catholic French Canadian emigrants told me also that they wanted to give up the errors of Rome in order to follow the gospel. In those two days I had anticipated the coming of forty-six new precious souls to Christ, after the breaking of the heavy and ignominious yoke of the pope. And my God knows that I say the truth when I say that this is my ordinary experience in the thirty years that I worked, not only in Canada, but in the great States of New York, Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Illinois, Ohio, Wisconsin, Michigan and Iowa. From what I have seen with my own eyes, I am sure that the Roman Catholic bishops say the truth, when they say that their Church has lost at least thirteen millions (13,000,000) of souls in the United States in less than a century!

But it is not any intention to make you believe that the many conversions of which I am the daily witness are all the result of my evangelical labors. I am happy to acknowledge that many times my only privilege was to reap the ripe fruits in the fields sown by much more faithful workers than I am. Every day I see the fulfilment of our dear Saviour's prophecy, "Owe

soweth, and another reapeth." In this way the praise and the glory must be given only to the Lord, who alone can give the increase, and make the fruits grow and ripen.

But there is a glory and a privilege which is really mine, and for which I ask my Orange brethren to help me to bless the Lord. It is the privilege of having suffered many humiliations, and gone through great trials and dangers for the gospel's sake. Quebec was obliged to put that city under martial law, and call the help of one thousand British bayonets to save my life, to the 5th of August last, when in Escanaba, Michigan, I received the terrible blow from which I am still suffering, occasionally my life has many times been saved only by a marvellous Providence of God.

But this letter is already too long. Let me end by asking you, in the name of your Saviour, to redouble your prayers, your efforts and your sacrifices, to hasten the evangelization and conversion of the French and Canadian people.

Though more than eighty-two years old, by the great mercy of God, I am still in the gap, fighting the common foe. More than ever I am in need of your fervent prayers and your support. One of the special works entrusted to my too feeble hands by our common Master, is to help the priests of Rome who begin to see the errors of their church, and want to accept the Truth. Another work which is also dear to my heart is to help young converted men and women to prepare themselves to scatter the saving lights of the Gospel among their relations and friends. Please continue to be the instruments of the mercies of God to strengthen my hands and cheer up my heart as long as I fight on this glorious battlefield till our merciful God gives us the joy to see the reign of Christ firmly established all over our dear Canada. Then with the Angels of Heaven we will sing, "Glory be to God; Babylon is fallen!"

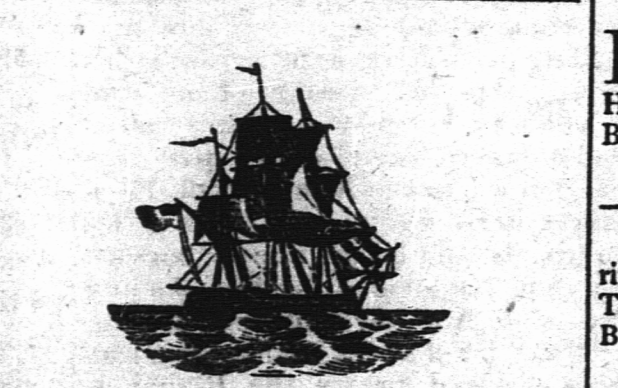
