Explains Progress Restoring Power Lines In S'ide Area

In the report of the Summerside Town Council meeting on Monday night it was stated that Councillor Dr. H.D. Clark, chairman of the electric light committee had indicated all areas served by the Summerside electric light plant should have power restored by the end of this week. In making this announcement, however, Dr. Clark said yesterday that this was in reference to the town-owned lines which are west of Summerside, serving the areas between Summerside and Miscouche, and the lines in St. Eleanors, Miscouche South, Miscouche North, Lot 16, South West Lot 16 and Belmont. Most of the work on these lines is already completed and a considerable part of the area has already received electricity as the work progressed. East of Summerside, Councillor Clark said that work was progressing favorably and power has been restored to the Reads Corner, Wilmet, Bedeque, and Freetown areas, and also along the line extending from Summerside through Sherbrooke to connect with the Scales hydro line at Kensington, and continuing on through Clermont, Indian River, Hamilton and Miscouche. In this area work is progressing satisfactorily through Darnley, Sea View and Spring Valley. The areas through Lower Malpeque and Irish town are also being worked on and it is expected that all areas east of Summerside will be completed within two weeks time.

Official Opening Of New Ice Plant At Alberton Today

Dr. H.E. MONTREAL (CP)—The U.S. dollar closed Tuesday at a discount of 5-32 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, down 1-32. It took 99 27-32 cents Canadian to buy \$1 American. Pound sterling \$2.80%, unchanged.

K. trade increased to \$40,100,000 from \$35,400,000. Britain has expressed concern over this widening gap in Canadian trade. Spokesmen for British exporters have recently made several appeals to Canadians to buy more from Britain and less from the U. S. but apparently these have not had much effect on the Canadian importer.

position said it would be a waste of time for the House to discuss the resolution unless there was complete unanimity from all members concerned. He noted that some opposition to a causeway had already been voiced from Kings County but hoped that the members from that County would support it to a man. "We don't want one dissenting voice in this House and we don't want one dissenting voice in this Province," he said. Hon. B. Earle MacDonald said if the Federal Government would not consider building a causeway, there were certain private interests that were willing and anxious to build it providing they were given the concessions now being granted the Canadian National Railways. Mr. MacDonald said that as recently as the day before yesterday he was in touch with a large investment house in Montreal who are quite interested in the project. They seemed to think it would not be a difficult matter to raise as much as \$100,000,000 to raise an entirely dependent upon the Federal Government—all we want is the permission to build it and we will find the men who are willing to take it on he said. S. S. Hessian, Fifth Kings, assured the Leader of the Opposition that all Kings members were solidly behind the project. "If our Federal member thinks differently that's his business. As far as the Senators go they don't represent anything but themselves," he said. Mr. Hessian challenged the Opposition leader's claim that he was the first to introduce the idea of a causeway in the Legislature.
