LYNN FIRE SWEEPS FOR HALF A MILE LYNN, Mass., April 30—Fire which swept along for half a mile in the Washington street section of the Lynn waterfront on Friday destroyed the buildings occupied by four manufacturing concerns, the old Tibbets Hotel, a laundry, a bakery and set ablaze fifteen tenement buildings. In Memoriam REV. STEPHEN McQUAID Seldom has there been such a gloom cast over a community as when news of the death of Rev. Stephen McQuaid, an ecclesiastical student, was received at his home, Green Bay. His unexpected death took place in Holy Cross Hospital, Calgary, on Saturday morning March 18th. Mr. McQuaid matriculated from his home school to P. W. College, on receiving a license from there to attend school for a short time at St. Dunstan's, P. E. I. He then studied and qualified as a telegrapher at the Dominion School of Telegraphy, Toronto and from there obtained a position as agent on the C. N. R. at Teft, Western Canada. Feeling himself called to a nobler life he entered St. Dunstan's University where by his genial companionship and good conduct he won the esteem and admiration of his fellow students. Graduating from St. Dunstan's in 1917 he had entered upon his third year in St. Augustine's Seminary, Toronto, but owing to ill health was obliged to relinquish his studies in November when he went West to recuperate. His condition was far worse than ever expected by himself or his friends and he gradually sank. His funeral took place on Monday morning, March 20th, when Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. W. E. Cameron with Rev. Fr. Doyle and Rev. Fr. McAdam as deacon and subdeacon, respectively. The boys' choir rendered the solemn music of the Requiem in their most effective manner and after mass the procession wound its way to St. Mary's Cemetery where the remains were laid to rest. He leaves to mourn besides a host of friends a sorrowing mother, one sister, a nun in St. Luke's Academy, Montreal and four brothers, Francis, James and Peter in Green Bay and Michael, an ecclesiastical student, Calgary, who was with him during his sickness and death. RUSSIAN FAMINE RELIEF Some American statements about the peak of the acute famine period being passed seem liable to be misunderstood in Canada. The American relief organization, supported by the financial resources of the nation to the extent of \$20,000,000 is undoubtedly helping to save the situation. But it should be clearly understood that some of the worst provinces are still being cared for by British funds, including Canada's growing contribution through the Canadian Committee of the Save the Children Fund. American corn is being shipped into all the famine stricken provinces. Temporarily, to allow the American shipments all possible facilities for inland transportation, the British relief organization—the Society of Friends and the Society of Friends in Canada—have their claim on Russian railway service. It is especially urgent that seed should be distributed within the next few weeks to stem off another famine next autumn. But when the immediate rush of American supplies is over, the British relief workers will still have to continue operating food kitchen, especially to feed the children, until the end of August. Sir Benjamin Robertson, the British authority on Indian famine relief, after visiting Russia in January and February of this year, with the approval of the British government, anticipated the present claims about the peak of the famine period being overcome, due to the arrival of American corn and seed. He expressed the hope that the optimism of the American relief association would prove to be correct. But, in any case, Sir Benjamin added, it did not relieve the British organizations from the task they have undertaken to feed the famine-stricken people in certain provinces, until next harvest. A balanced ration is necessary for the children. When they are brought in to the rescue station, they seem to be in such a condition physically that the greatest care has to be taken in feeding them. They need something more than corn. The consignments of food from Canada, in accordance with the system established by the Save the Children Fund, allow the children to be given one nourishing meal a day, consisting possibly of cocoa, bread and bean soup varied with milk and rice. Under the efficient British administration, the cost of feeding a child is only 25 cents a week, including all overhead charges. Four dollars is sufficient to feed one child till the middle of August; and Sir George Burn the venerable treasurer of the Canadian Committee is gladdened by the arrival, in almost every mail of substantial contributions to the fund.
